Fireman tells of threatened revolt

Dear Editor: Recently, the Markham press carried a Front Page story concerning the Markham Town Fire Department. It was unfortunate that statements made by the Fire Chief (suspended) were not checked out since the article, on the whole, was quite misleading.

As a member of the volunteer brigade, I feel the citizens of Markham have the right to know the

facts. The facts are as follows:

Statement. "The men at no time ever complained to me".

Fact. A special meeting was called by the men to complain of the unwarranted dismissal of a member of 17 yrs. service.

The Chief stated two reasons for the dismissal which upon investigation were both proven false.

Due to this, and other

evidence of misrepresentation of so-called facts by the Chief, the volunteers lost all respect and confidence in him. Rather than simply walk out and leave the town unprotected the matter was turned over to Council. Statement. He refused to believe the men were against him.

Statement. "A Volunteer is one who works for nothing".

Fact. The men on the brigade have volunteered their services to the town to fight fires at any occasion, at any time, day or night, winter or summer, to drop whatever they are doing at a moments notice, and proceed to the hall, and perform any task assigned.

There are a number of self-employed men on the brigade who in a strictly financial point of view could lose money every time the siren blows.

Needless to say none of the men are here for the money we receive.

Statement. The men on the brigade averaged \$700 a man.

Fact. There was not one man on the brigade that received \$700 fighting fires last year.

Statement. The Chief's salary is \$8,500.

Fact. The Chief also received the same rate of pay as the volunteers for all fire calls answered between 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. plus any fires on the weekends. The Chief was also paid for all fire calls answered by the brigade while he attended the course in fire prevention for 8 weeks.

Statement. "I am not a spit and polish person".

Fact. The gold braid on his hat alone cost the taxpayers \$27.00. The gold on the coat and shirt cost extra.

Statement. He has enjoyed working for the Town and trying to make the brigade a fine one.

Fact. The Markham Fire Brigade has been a fine one for more years than most of us can remember. Chief Gough can hardly claim credit for the fact that the brigade has not had a fatal fire for thirty years since he has not yet reached two years as Chief. Some credit must surely go to Chuck Hoover (17 yrs. as Chief) and the men before him, who evidently thought a brigade could operate efficiently without all the so-called discipline. There is no time in any fire brigade, whether it be full time or volunteer to sit on your fanny and depend on luck.

One additional fact. There are at present two men on the brigade who wrote and passed the same examination for Fire Chief as Mr. Gough. One of them has been elected Chief by the men of the brigade. The other is also an officer on the brigade.

Ray Coxworth, who is now Fire Chief as far as the men are concerned, was at the fire with the car ahead of the truck. This is only one example of the alertness of the brigade.
