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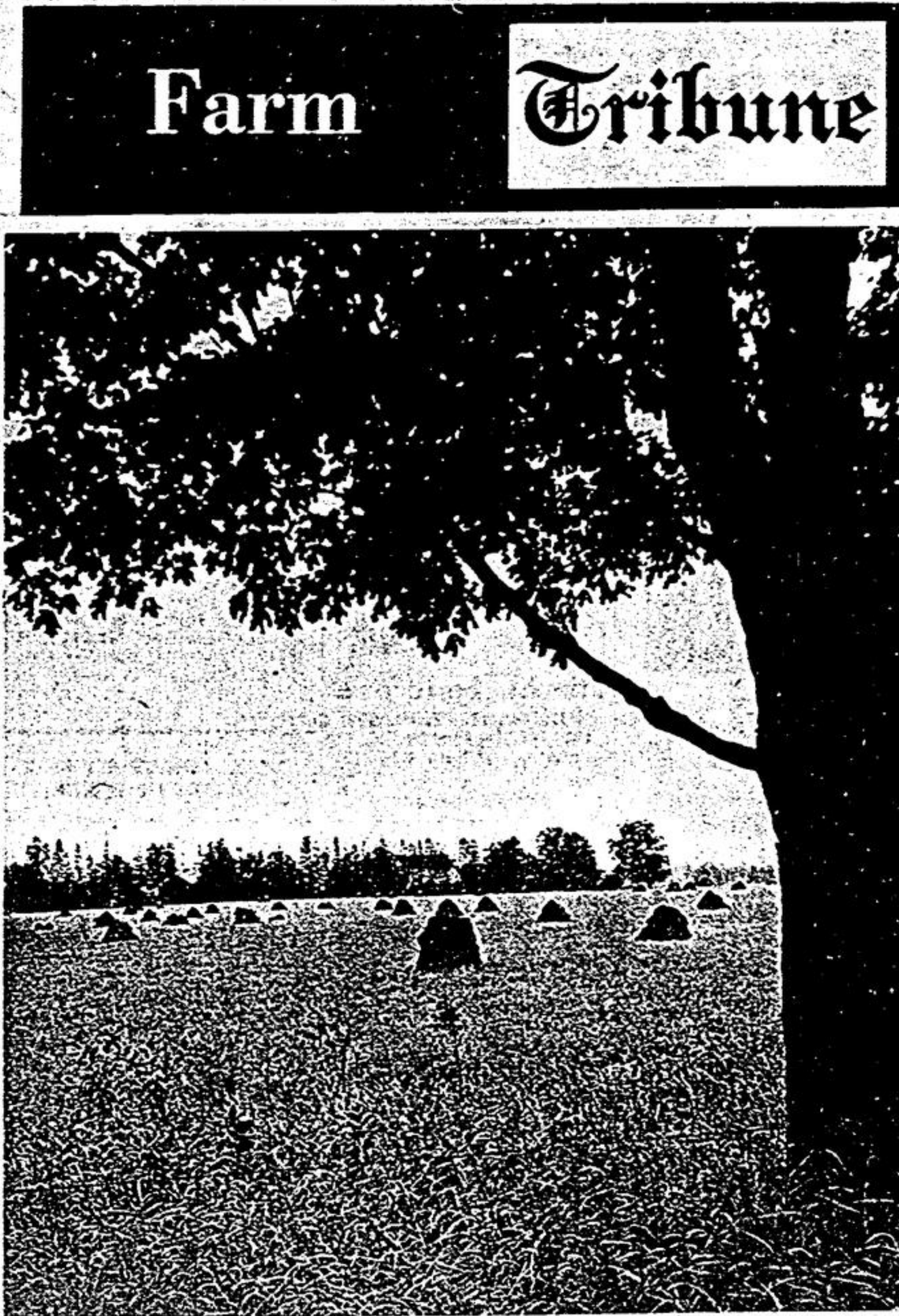

Direct cut hay and formic acid Used in bunker silo experiment

Not much joy in the haying business last week. There was no way to get it dry enough for baling. It underlines the need for a better way to harvest and store hay.

Haylage is the answer now on many farms, but we are still looking for other alternatives.

Ken Stevenson, up at Udora, is trying a very new one this year. He put about a hundred tons of hay into a bunker silo, direct cut.

Normally, there would be an awful stink from the butyric acid formed. But he treated the silage as it went through the forage harvester with formic acid.

This acid stops most of the biological action so that the silage comes out green and sweet. Ken is the first person in Ontario to try it, that I know of, and we will be watching the results closely.

The only good feature of last week's weather was that it helped our Sunrise Tour attendance. It was great to see around 250 farmers from York at the Elora Research Station last Thursday.

We saw a lot of up-to-date research in crops. Soybeans, barley and wheat were all well covered, with some excellent work going on to improve corn production too.

The new dairy barn appears to be well set up to get us better information on handling dairy cattle. The twelve-cow milking unit, free stalls, manure removal system, calf housing area, and feed processing centre are all quite relevant to dairying in the seventies.

We hope to get back to Elora frequently.

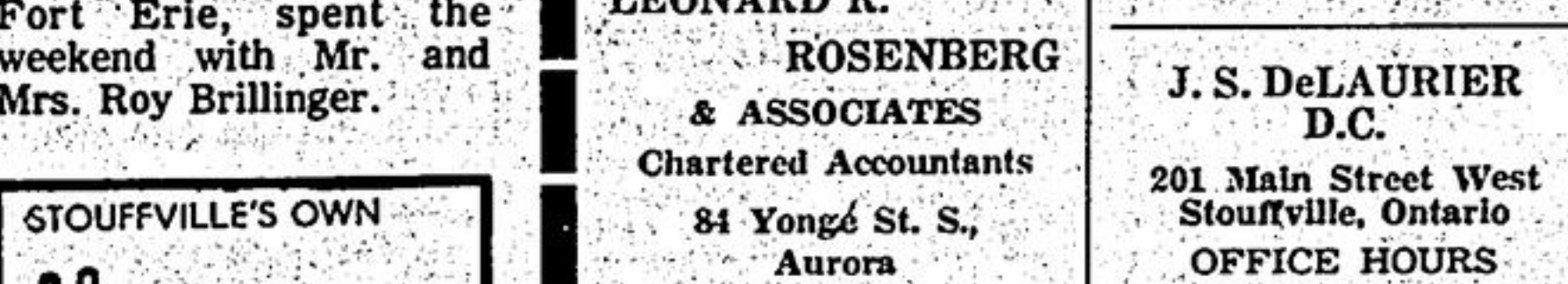
The cattle will be exhibited at two shows there before being offered for sale.
