# Peewee team to Ontario semi-finals

Play Sterling

Host Madoc rivals

Season ends early

STOUFFVILLE — The Peewees opened another door to the Ontario Championship by taking East Gwillimbury 7-4 at Mount Albert. This was their second victory in the best-of-three series. They now advance to the semi-finals with Sterling, a town 15 miles north of Trenton.

Once again, the Don Anderson Haulage boys made the most of the least with 7 runs on a meagre 4 hits. Five walks also helped. After an 8-4 loss in the initial game, East Gwillimbury bounced back with a first inning explosion which saw them hit a single, a homer, a single and then another homer. That gave them four runs and a fairly commanding lead. In the fourth inning, Stouffville tied it up and then added a three-run buffer in the fifth.

After the initial outburst by the losers, Rick Marshman went to the hill and pitched superbly allowing only two safeties in the remainder of the game. He also looked good with the club, clouting a double which put the truckers out front.

Only Marshman and Ron McDowell earned any hits. Each chalked up two. For East Gwillimbury, Dave Farrel added two singles to homers by Ken Strong and Ron Thompson.

The first game of the semi-finals gets underway at Sterling on Saturday at 4:00 p.m. The second is slated for Stouffville the following Saturday. Should the locals win the toss for the location of a third game, a double-header is a possibility at the Stouffville park.

Rust won't retard the boys' reflexes. Coach, Jack Watson has arranged a game with a strong Claremont team to begin at 6:30 p.m. tonight (Thursday), in Stouffville.

STOUFFVILLE — It's another eleventh hour ball game for the Stouffville Juveniles when Madoc arrives for the second clash of the Ontario semi-finals on Saturday night. They trail one game to nil in the best-of-three series after a nail-biting ten inning affair in Madoc.

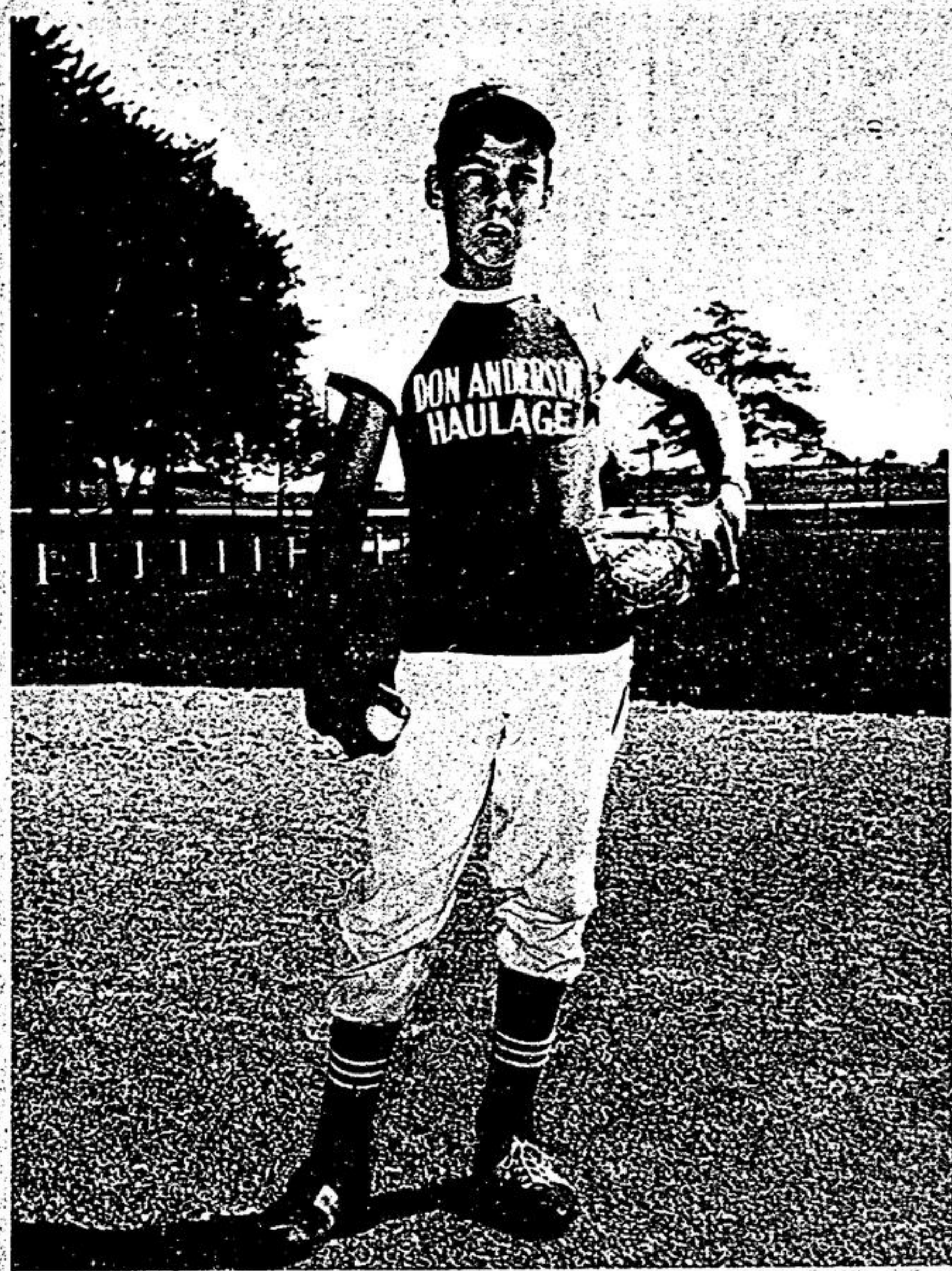
Game time on Saturday is 8:00 p.m. and a large crowd is expected to be out to spur the team in the direction of a provincial championship.
