'Union Villa' Occupancy Oct. 1

UNIONVILLE — 'Union Villa', a handsome new home for senior citizens at Unionville, will welcome its first residents, Oct. 1. This is the latest word from the Administrator, and he's confident everything will be in readiness to meet this date.

The location is west of Kennedy Road and north from Hwy. 7.

Who can qualify for acceptance? Certain medical requirements are laid down by the Charitable Institutions Act, the administrator explained, and, following a full physical examination, the Admitting Committee of the Board of Directors reviews the application. "A home for the aged can provide nursing, but not active treatment," he said.

How much does it cost? For those who can afford it, full operating costs are paid by the residents. For those who cannot, some assistance is available from the government and the balance is raised by the community. The rate at present is — \$12 per day for the Nursing Assistance Wing; \$10 per day for single rooms and \$9 per person sharing a double room. These figures include the cost of drugs and minor medical supplies.
