ONE WIN FROM FINALS

Peewees host Sterling Saturday

STOUFFVILLE - The Peewees, Stouffville's last hope for an Ontario Championship, could advance to the Provincial finals, Saturday.

They need one more win over Sterling, who come to town seeking to square the series. A large crowd is anticipated. Game time is 3 o'clock.

In the first contest, Stouffville travelled 110 miles to this community north of Trenton and returned with a 4-0 victory. Once again, Rick Marshman sparked with a convincing four-hit effort. He struck out six and walked two.

Marshman's heroics weren't restricted to hurling, as he clouted a single, double and triple. Ron McDowell continued to show his power at the plate as he clubbed a round-tripper and a single. The Stouffville cause was also aided by Howie Jones with a single and a two-bagger.

Defensively, Keith Acton had to be alert as he recorded eight put-outs. Manager, Wilf Morley reported that 'the team is functioning as a well-oiled unit and each win is everybody's win'.

If the Don Anderson Haulage boys triumph over Sterling on Saturday they will advance to the Ontario finals against Chatsworth or Beamsville. A loss would take them back to Sterling for a 'rubber match'.

Tonight, the Peewees play the first game of the league championships with East Gwillimbury at 6.30 p.m. at Stouffville. Markham arrives tomorrow evening at 6.30 for an exhibition encounter.

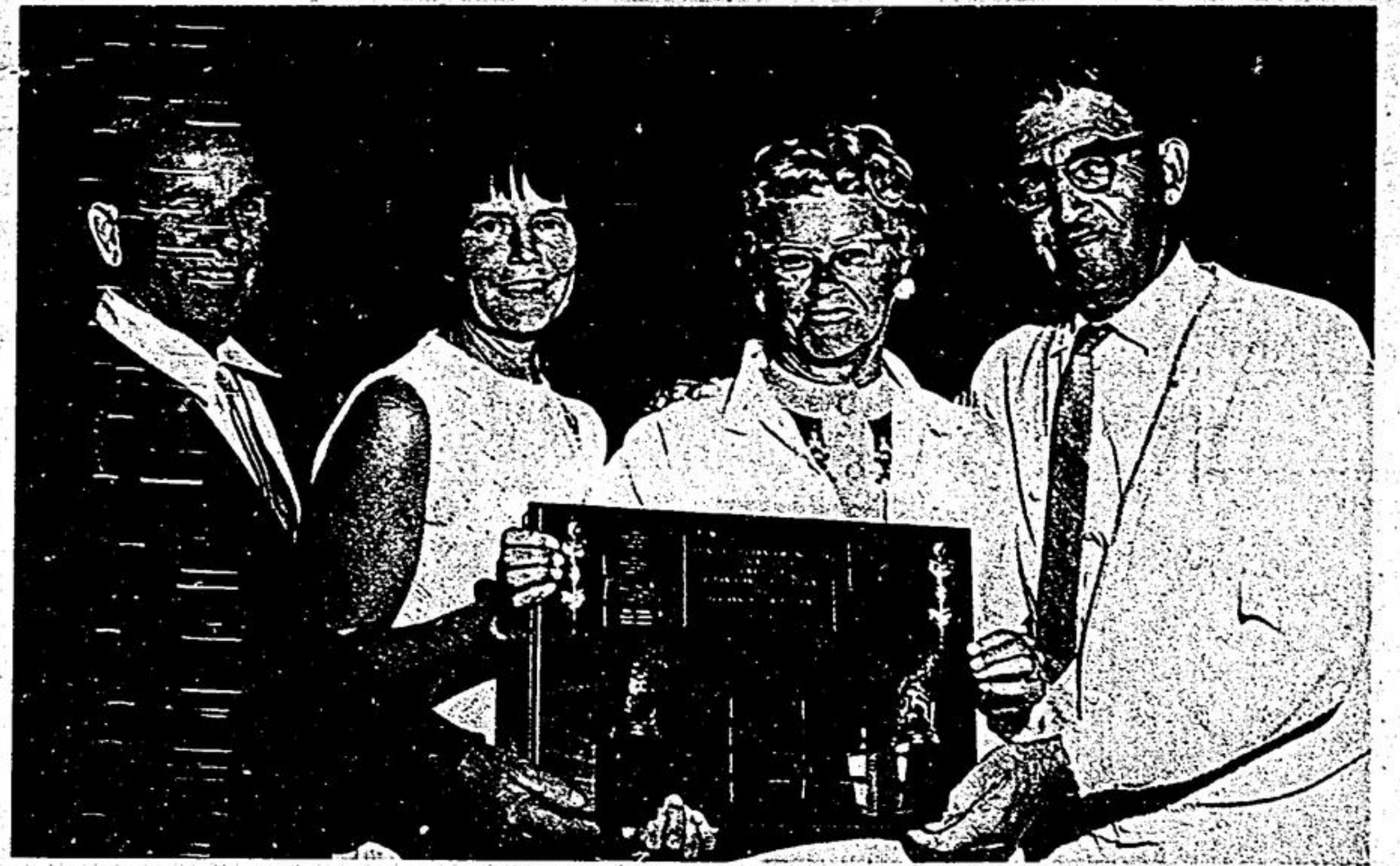
