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Centre for cerebral palsied Construction start this fall

MARKHAM — Work is expected to begin this fall on a centre for young adults, severely handicapped by cerebral palsy.

The building, to be located on part of the 50 acre Markham-York Hospital site, conc. 9, Markham, is a pilot project in Canada. The cost has been estimated at \$1 1/2 million.

The structure, when completed, will serve not only as a residence, but also as an instructional workshop and therapy centre.

At present, boys and girls, up to age 18, are accommodated at locations provided by the Ontario Society for Crippled Children. Older ones, however, must be cared for at home or in government institutions. For the parents of these young people, the distance from Metro Toronto and adjacent areas, is too great. The Markham site is considered ideal.

Considerable funds have already been raised but additional support is required to assure success of the venture. In an effort to further promote the program, an evening of vocal and instrumental music will be presented in the Markham Arena, Sept. 18. All proceeds will be forwarded to the 'Participation House' project. At a Markham-York hospital board meeting, Sept. 3, vice-president Leonard Mason revealed that, subject to change, a lease for a period of 99 years had been arranged. He said that re-zoning of the site from agricultural to institutional was now awaiting O.M.B. approval

with no holdup anticipated. Sewerage services to the property, Mr. Mason said, would cost an estimated \$27,000 with the hospital board, the cerebral palsy organization and the association for the mentally retarded all co-operating to cover this expenditure.
