Evidence revealed that constables David Hadden and Harold Davis observed a car pull into the parking lot of the Mansion House Hotel, August 15, in an erratic manner.

The car was followed along Main Street, where it forced several other vehicles off the road, including the police cruiser as it attempted to pull alongside. The driver was finally stopped west of conc. 10.

was forthcoming in a week, he would contact the council himself.

Mr. McKellar said one letter had already been sent without reply. He agreed to ask the Clerk to send another.

Mr. Laushway said there was no use contacting municipal employees who had no power to act. He said the matter would have to be dealt with by the Pickering council. Councillor Ian Chapman

observed that much of the contact between the village and Pickering Township had been verbal. "It just seems to die on the vine," he said.

The problem dates back several months when Pickering showed hesitancy in approving a fire call account submitted by Stouffville, following the brigade's attendance at a barn blaze in Altona. No fire agreement currently exists between the two municipalities. The Altona community is located within the Claremont fire area.

Reeve Laushway told The Tribune, following the meeting Thursday, that until a definite policy is laid down, Stouffville firemen would respond to calls in the north-west corner of Pickering, regardless of payment.
