Community project

GOODWOOD - The memory of Goodwood's last family physician has been preserved for posterity.


The names of Dr. Robert E. Darling and his wife, Helen are engraved on a beautiful graveside monument in the Goodwood Cemetery.

Funds for the project were raised in a community campaign organized earlier this summer by Mrs. Gordon Todd and Mrs. Reuben Maye. Receipts exceeded \$800.

Dr. Darling died in 1949. His wife predeceased him in 1943.

The inscription on the stone reads: Robert E. Darling, M.D. 1869 - 1949. His beloved wife Helen M. Hostrawser, 1871 - 1943.

Future of Century City

Queen's Park reply expected Oct. 15

UXBRIDGE TWP. - Oct. 15 (today) is anticipated as the deadline date for a reply from Queen's Park on the future of 'Century City.'

If the project gets the green light, then the Los Angeles firm of Kauffman and Broad could loosen the purse strings on the remainder of a promised \$4,000,000 loan.

If the Ontario Government continues to 'hedge' on the issue, then Revenue Properties Limited will have to look elsewhere for financial aid.

Louis Devor, a company director, admitted several

writs had been issued by mortgage-holders but no judgments granted.

"We're working on several avenues of approach, to keep things calmed down a little," he said. Mr. Devor told *The Tribune* that many former owners of 'Century City' land had been enquiring as to the financial status of the company. Delinquent interest payments date back to the middle of May. Tax arrears exceed \$20,000.

Revenue Properties' investment in land alone is said to be about \$12 million. About half of this amount is outstanding.

throughout the ordeal. Mrs. Rose is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Les Ogden, north of Island Lake. Her husband, Donald, passed away suddenly several years ago. She has a daughter, Betty and a son, Bruce.

Mrs. Rose was rushed by private car to Newmarket where doctors were waiting to administer treatment. While physicians now feel sure the arm can be saved, many weeks of therapy will be required.

Wins six trophies

STOUFFVILLE - An all-Canadian girl won the hearts and applause of an all-American audience, Sunday, with a riding performance described by her instructor, Ben Ewen, Bayview Farms as 'just fabulous'.

Debbie Davies, 16, a junior equestrienne but an open-class competitor at a show near Chicago, scored heavily with all judges. She captured two individual championships, two reserve championships, six trophies and twenty-one ribbons.

Mr. Ewen, more than 40 years a trainer and previously with the R.C.M.P. Musical Ride, took four of his horses to the meet and Debbie rode all of them, including 'Ala Flame' and her favorite, 'Baska'. He said that in some divisions, there were up to 30 entries. "She cleaned house," he said, "I've never enjoyed a more satisfying experience."

Debbie, a Grade 10 student at Woburn Collegiate, trains three and sometimes four times a week, including after school and on weekends. At present, about 60 members, mostly young people, receive riding instructions at Bayview. The location, on the Gormley Road and conc. 7, Whitchurch, is the former Arthur Paisley property.

VIVIAN - Eight riding horses, all show stock, died Thursday night in a barn fire on the property of Michael J. Fortin, Hwy. 48, near Vivian.

Six others were saved, released by neighbors who came to the aid of the owner. No one was injured.

The blaze was first noticed by Billy Card who lives next door. With his father, Wm. Card Sr., they were able to free four of the animals.

Several of the horses that died were being boarded on the property, Mr. Fortin said. The blaze

has been attributed to spontaneous combustion. Firemen from Mount Albert and Stouffville were called to the scene.

Mr. and Mrs. Fortin moved to Vivian five years ago.
