

Dr. Darling memorial

Community project

GOODWOOD - The memory of Goodwood's last family physician has been preserved for posterity.

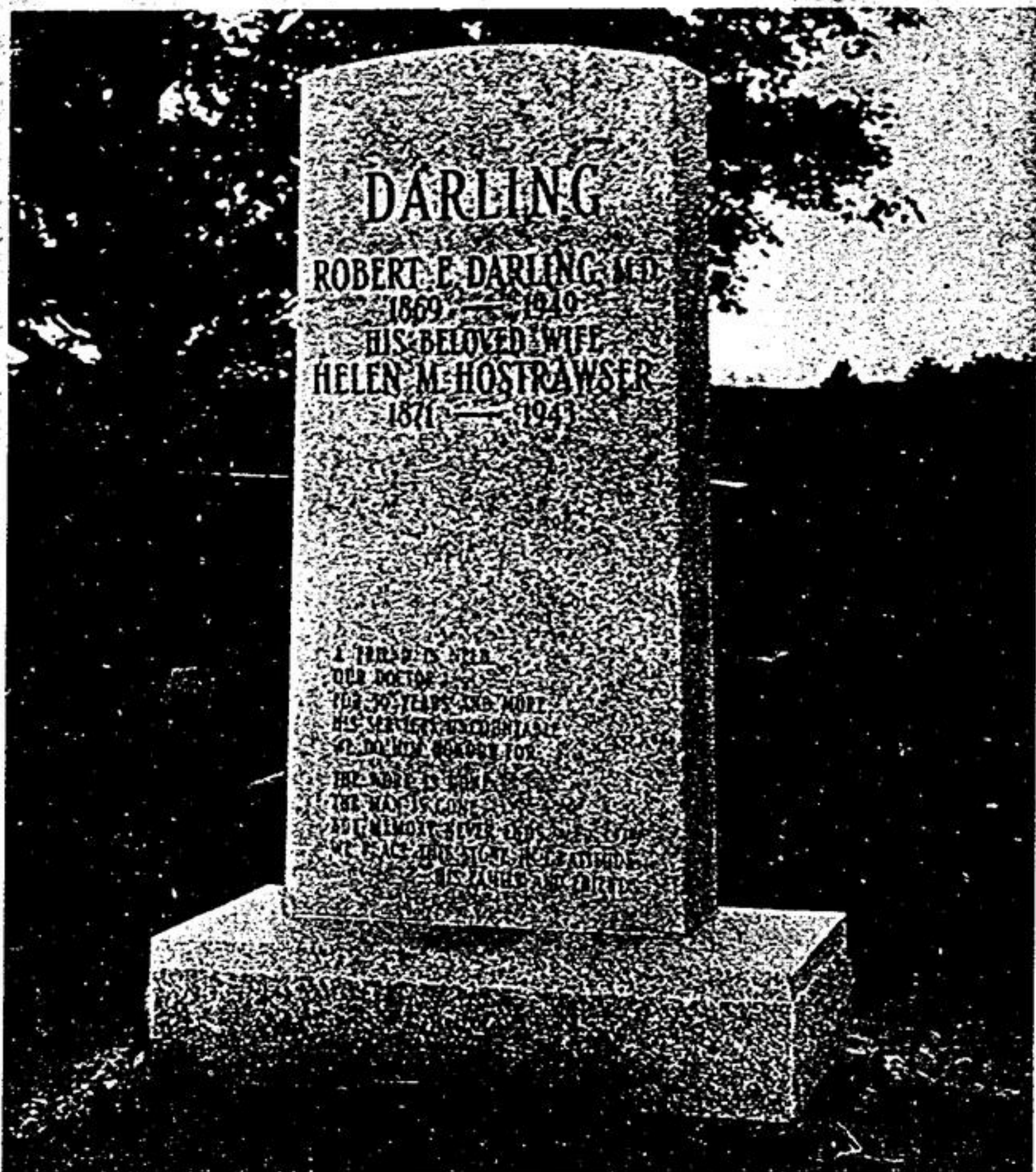
The names of Dr. Robert E. Darling and his wife, Helen, are engraved on a beautiful graveside monument in the Goodwood Cemetery.

Funds for the project were raised in a community campaign organized earlier this summer by Mrs. Gordon Todd and Mrs. Reuben Maye. Receipts exceeded \$800.

Dr. Darling died in 1949. His wife predeceased him in 1943.

The inscription on the stone reads: Robert E. Darling, M.D. 1869 - 1949. His beloved wife Helen M. Hostrawser, 1871 - 1943.

'A friend in need Our doctor, For 50 years and more His services uncountable, We do him honor for. The work is done The man is gone, But memory never ends We place this stone in gratitude, -His family and friends.'

Hold up hiring recreation director

VANDORF - The hiring of a permanent recreation director to serve the new Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, at a salary of \$8,400, has been held up on recommendation from councillor Merlyn Baker.

Whitchurch would be passing the motion, the expenditure would be shared by the entire Area. Councillor Baker objected. He said that since ratepayers of Stouffville would be covering a portion of the cost, the contract should be held up until after Jan. 1. He noted too that the amount of money involved was too large to be approved without further consideration. He asked that the recommendation, in writing, should come from the Recreation Commission. Members agreed.

World match - make it your goal

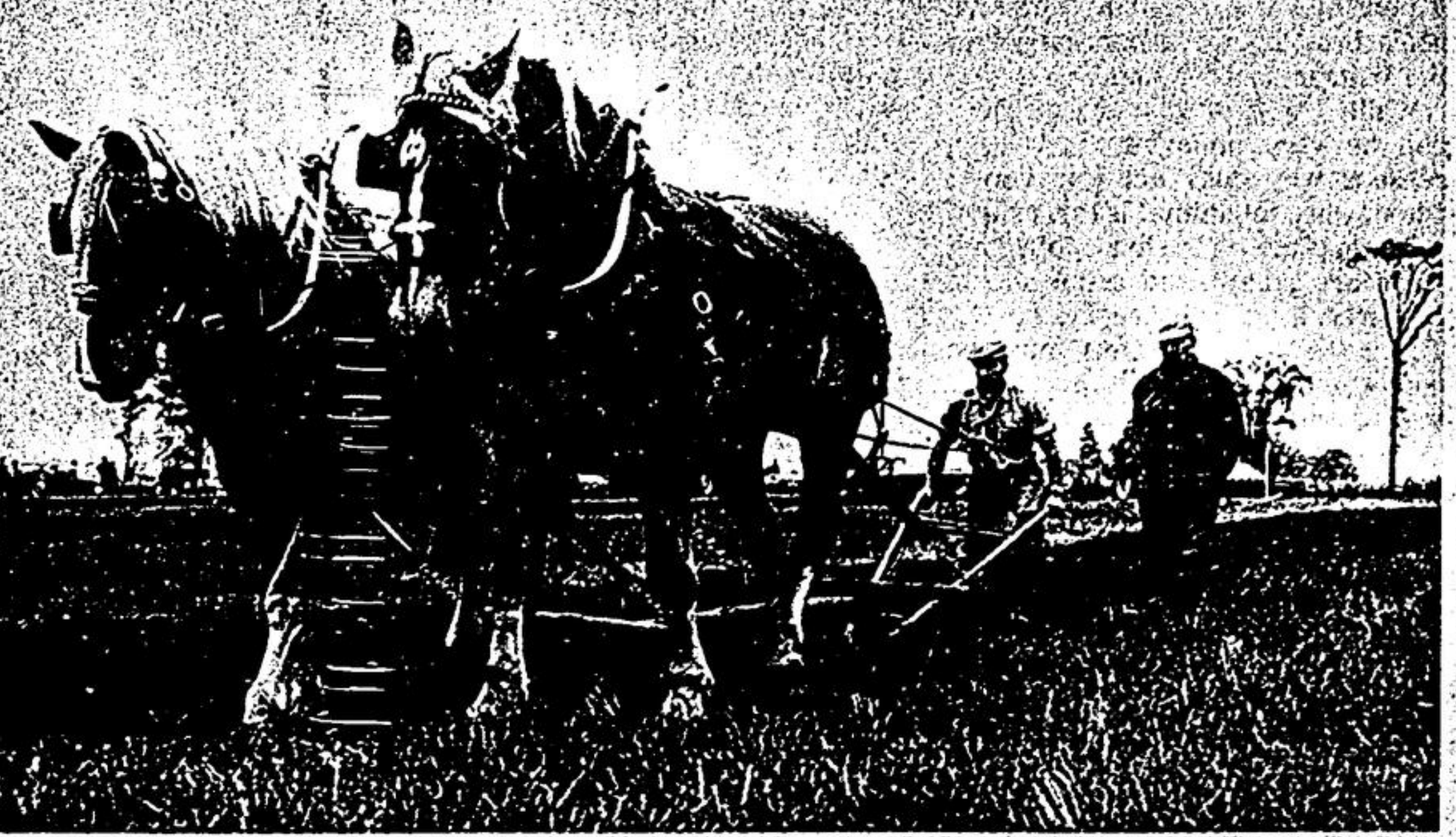
