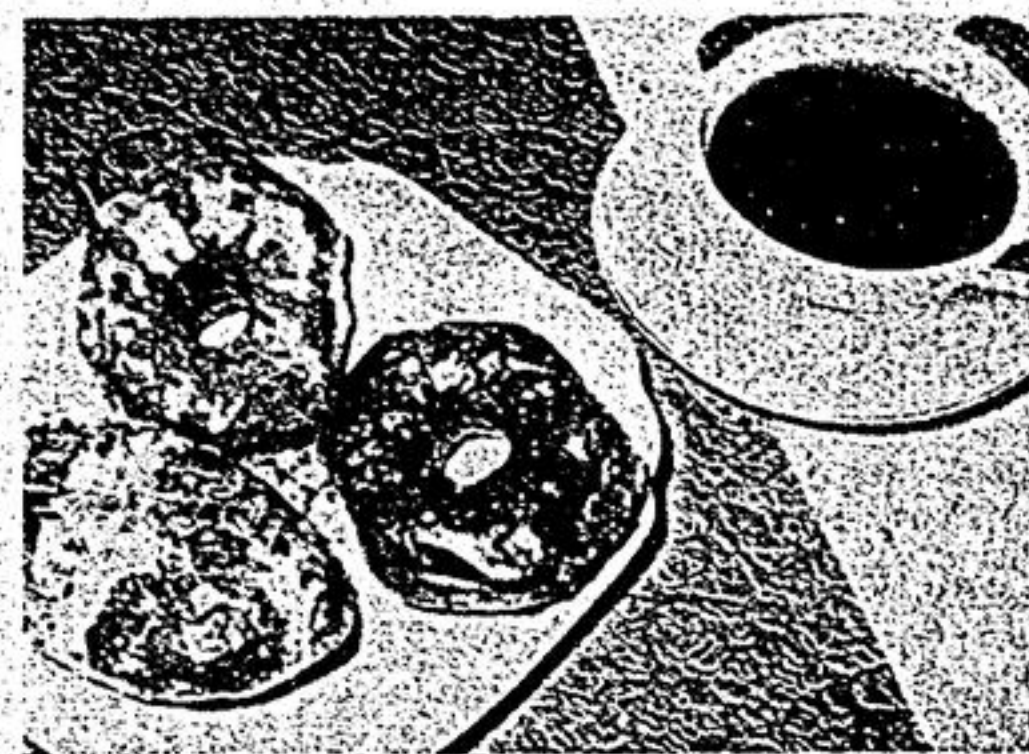

For U.N.I.C.E.F.

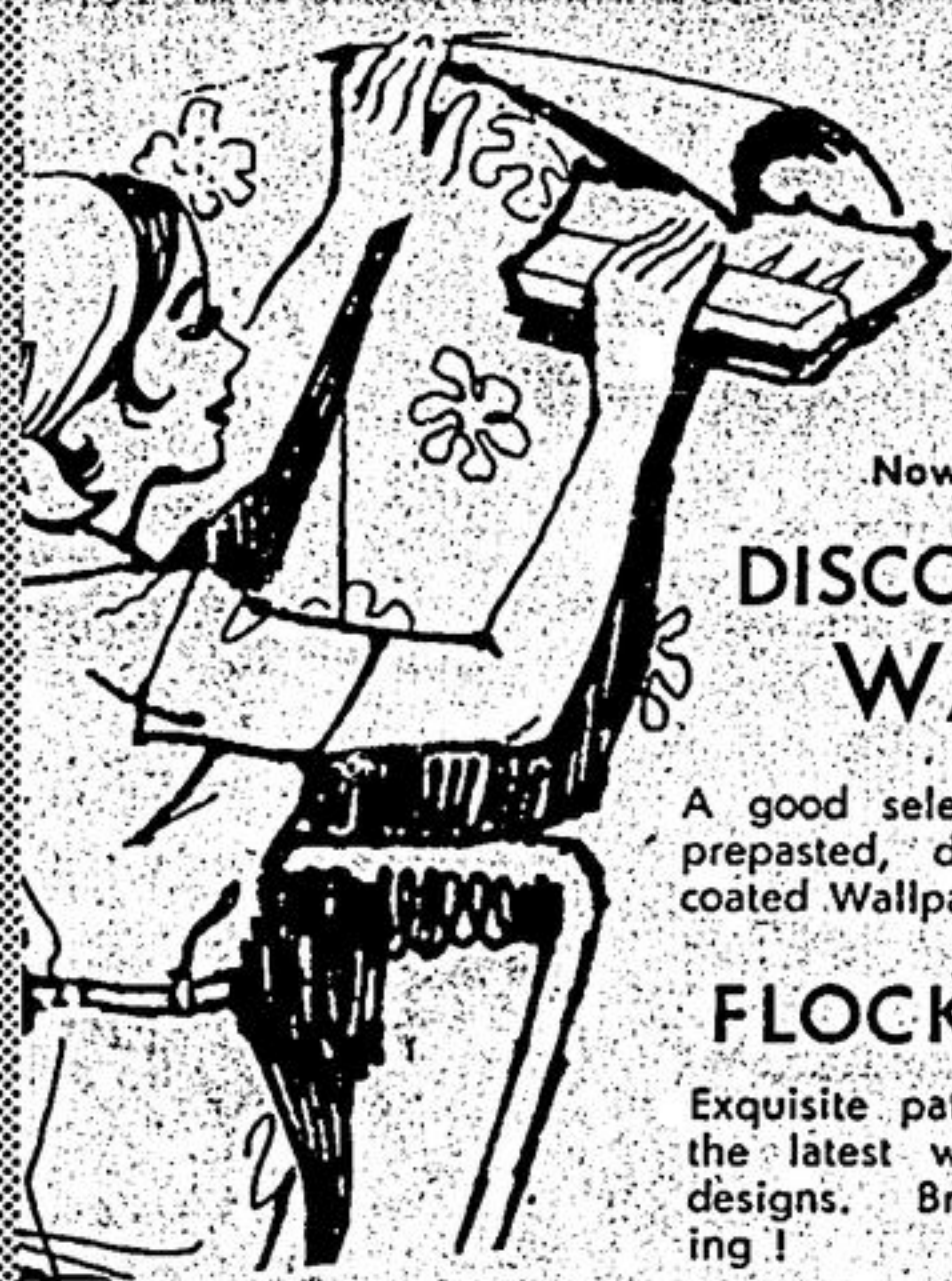
