STOUFFVILLE — During the past softball season, Stouffville's Pee wee team advanced to the Ontario finals, losing out to Grimsby.

Wilfred Morley brought the matter to members' attention, Oct. 15. The total cost has been estimated at \$200.

Reeve Ken Laushway said the request would be studied, by the finance mittee with a report likely by the next meeting.

Unionville Arena

No 'public' skating

UNIONVILLE — Public skating as such, has been cancelled this season at the Unionville Arena.

That is, the one night a week when young and old join together for an evening on the blades, is no more. Instead, one date (third Saturday) in the month will be set aside for 'adults only'. The age classification is 21 years and over. The Newmarket Brass Band will provide the music.

Arena manager Ben Gayman said most adults absolutely refuse to skate with the 'kids'. He noted too, that few teenagers are interested in this kind of recreation. He said that with so many belonging to

hockey teams and the figure skating club, they have little time left. Manager Gayman recalled one Saturday last winter when only 38 turned up. On the same night at Markham, he said, the crowd totalled 39. "When you're trying to make a dollar, it's not practical to tie the ice up for three hours for so few people," he said. But the 'oldtimers', that's different. They love to skate and they love the band. And the band loves to play, guaranteeing the rink from 12 to 20 members for a fee of \$50. In Stouffville, rink manager Don Lewis plans to continue Saturday night skating as long as the crowd holds up. Last week, he had about 150. He'll also host the 'adults only', replacing the 'live' organ with records.

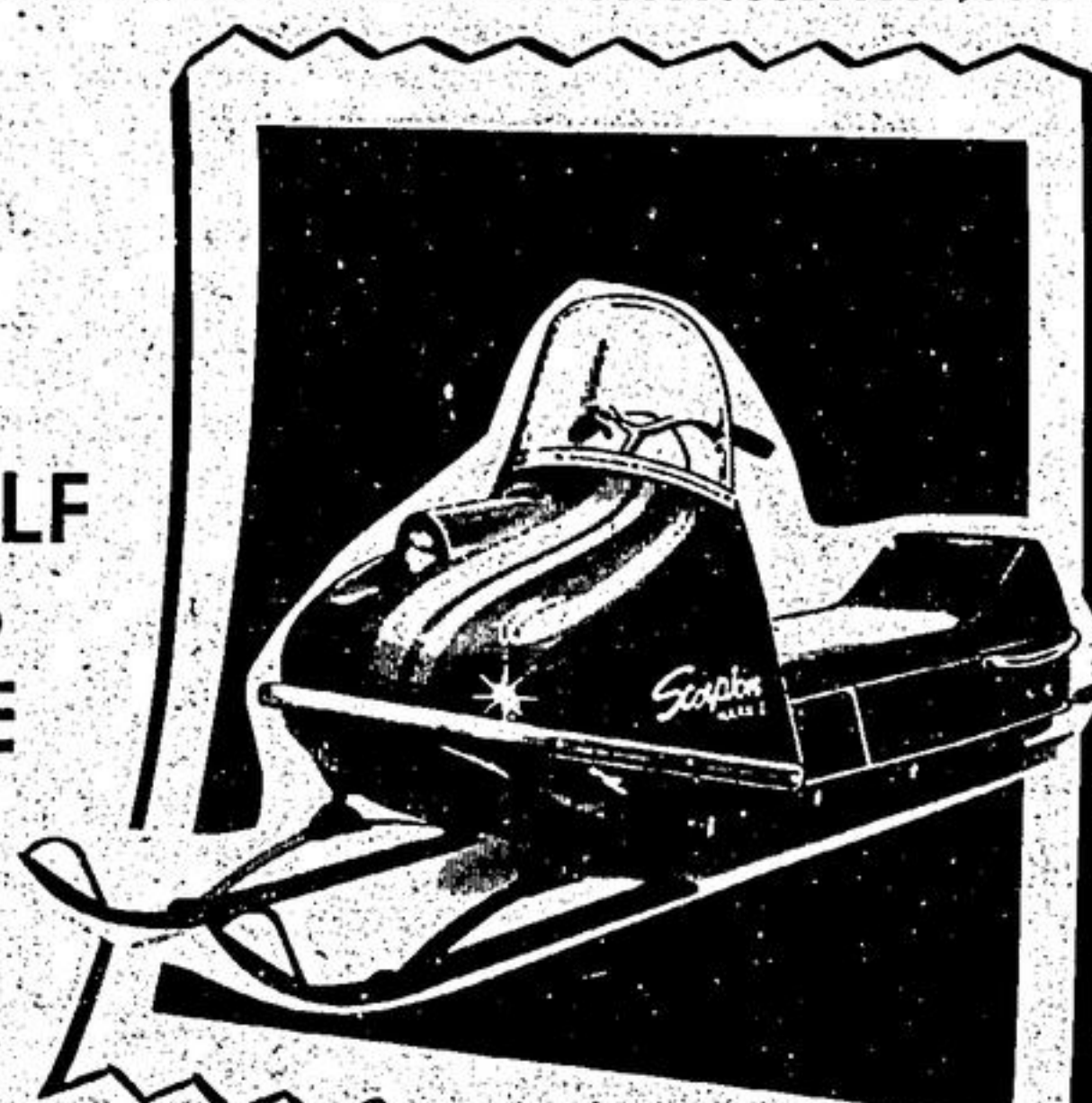
