High School dress policy  
— subject to change

Pant suit styles not acceptable

STOUFFVILLE—While pant suits are increasing in popularity, both as casual and formal wear, such styles still don't meet the dress standard for girls at Stouffville District Secondary School.

However, principal W.E. Duxbury, who keeps a close eye on such things, inserted the words 'at present' in his statement, saying the whole policy on student dress was subject to change.

Also 'grey listed' for girls are slacks and jeans. Shorts are banned for boys. These demands, while seemingly rigid, have been accepted with little complaint. So far, since the start of the September term, only two persons have been sent home and told to change.

In an effort to obtain a cross-section of opinion on this and other issues, Principal Duxbury has established a staff-student committee, headed by teacher chairman, Lin Jones. Also included are the presidents of the junior and senior student councils, Susan Christie and Glenn Gibson; the head prefect, Brian Baker plus additional representation from Grades 7 through 13.

All committee recommendations are reviewed by the principal and the vice-principal. They are also considered by remaining members of the staff.

Mr. Duxbury feels the ideal arrangement would be for students to establish and enforce their own set of rules. "Generally speaking, we have a very responsible student body here," he said, "but it only takes a few to spoil it for the rest."

While no hard and fast dress policy has been

established at Orchard Park, Summitview or St. Mark's, the principals agreed that their main concern was for cleanliness and neatness. "We expect the pupils and their parents to exercise good judgment," said Lorne Boadway of Summitview.

Rev. Paul Voegtlin officiated at the ceremony. The music was provided by a male quartette from Tofield accompanied at the organ by Miss Eunice Siler.

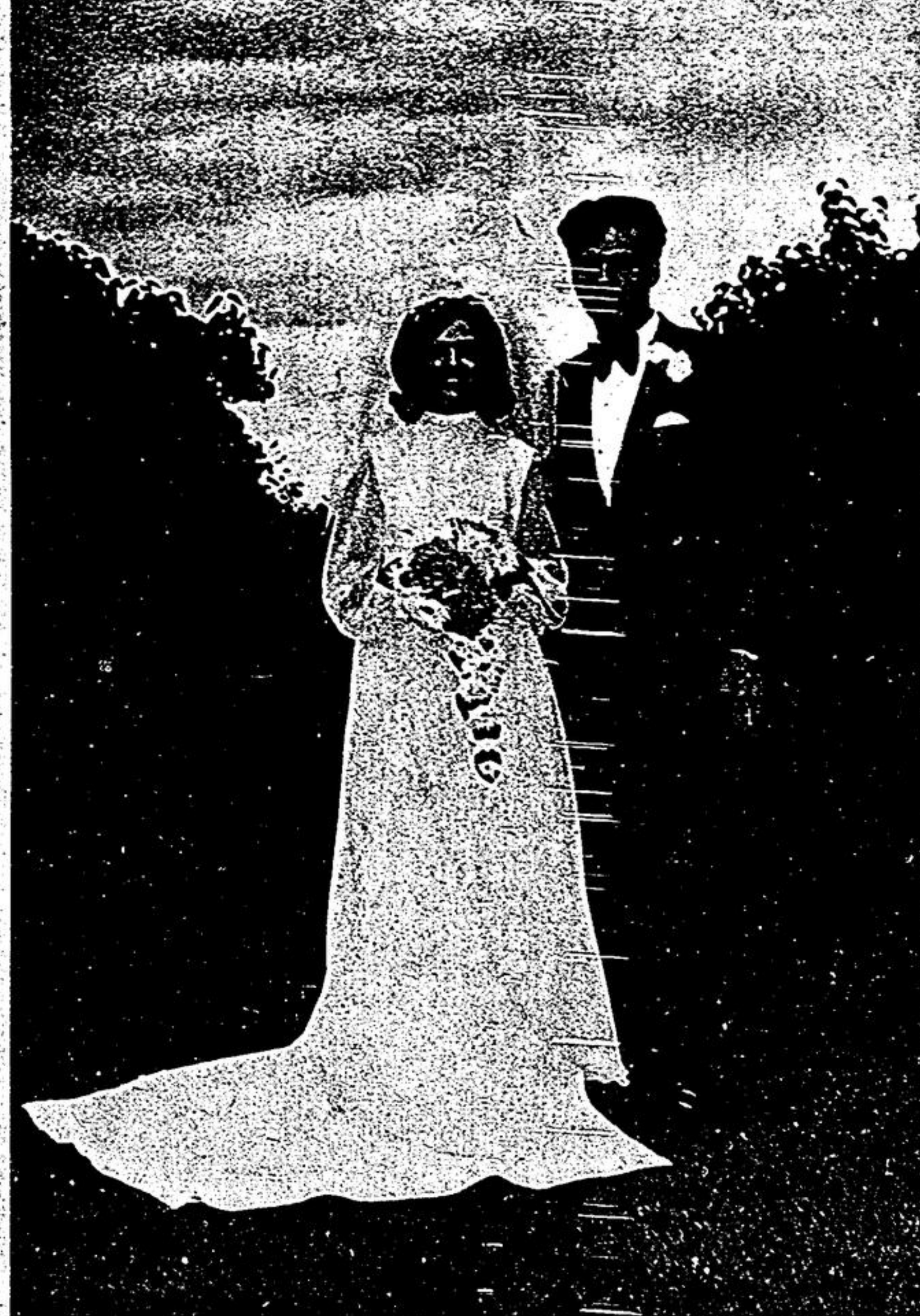
