BROUGHAM — Is the old Brougham tavern turned municipal building an antique or an eyesore?

Members of Pickering Twp. council are divided on the question.

Some want it removed while others wish it preserved.

In an effort to obtain a cross-section of opinion from the people, a resolution calling for the structures demolition and/or removal, has been put over until Monday, Nov. 16.

The building has been empty and unattended since 1966.

Councillor John Kruger said, in his opinion, the structure had no record of historical significance - first a way stop and tavern, then a barbershop and in 1946, a municipal building.

"It's not an architectural piece," he said, "in fact, someone suggested it looks more like 'The Last Chance Saloon'."




REMEMBER THIS?
