Not only were they good enough to advance to the Ontario Finals, but they showed the kind of good sportsmanship on and off the field that drew compliments even from rival fans.

The management, in particular their coach, Mr. Watson, worked hard with these lads and I was proud to have my boy playing under this kind of guidance and leadership.

It was disappointing then, that village council wouldn't see fit to recognize the team's effort through

some kind of grant to assist in the purchase of jackets.

Mr. Morley, in his request, asked for \$200, but I'm sure he would have been pleased to receive \$100 or even \$50. It was the principal of the thing that counted most and council's rejection that hurt most.

I might add that the kind of publicity Stouffville received, both through The Tribune and other papers where the team played, couldn't be bought for \$2,000.
