Eight injured in three accidents

WHITCHURCH TWP. — Eight persons were injured in three separate accidents over a ten hour period in the north-west part of Whitchurch Township, Dec. 6.

Nineteen year old Margaret Orr, Newmarket R.R.1, was seriously hurt when her car was in collision with a second driven by a Bay Ridges man. Aguilá Savoie, 43, and two passengers in his car, Stella Savoie, 39 and Randolph Savoie, 10, were also hospitalized.

Damage in the accident, which occurred north of Gorham Street on conc. 3, is estimated at \$2,400.

A MacTier man, 55 year old James MacMillan, was

injured when his car collided with a County snowplow, driven by Joshua Drewry, Newmarket, R.R.3, on the Bogartown cutoff. Damage is estimated at \$2,000.

Three persons were injured when two cars collided on the Vivian Road near Don Mills Road. Taken to hospital were the driver of one car, 37 year old Glen Davidson

and a passenger in his vehicle, 11 year old Wade Davidson, both of Cedar Valley, and a passenger in the second car, 58 year old Ambrose Berrard of Newmarket. Damage is estimated at \$2,000.
