April Cancer Canvass

Area objective is \$22,000

STOUFFVILLE — A goal of \$22,000 has been set as an objective in the April campaign for the Canadian Cancer Society, covering the areas of Markham, Unionville and Stouffville.

This is \$6,000 over the amount set out in 1972.

The canvass commences April 1.

A campaign committee in Stouffville, under the leadership of Mrs. Rita Laushway, has arranged for 13 captains and 80 canvassers to call on every resident in the area. The Stouffville boundary extends from conc. 7 on the west to the townline on the east, and from 19th Avenue on the south to the Bloomington Road in the north.

Private pond

Considered a hazard

STOUFFVILLE — A home-owner on Manitoba Street considers an open pond on the former Lehman farm, a hazard, and has requested through Ward 5 representative, June Button, that Council take action to have the area fenced off.

The same site was the subject of much discussion several years ago.

It was noted that while the majority residents in that area have constructed backyard fences to keep their children in, there was always the chance they might leave the property by other means.

Mrs. Button said a temporary barricade had been erected around the pond, but it had since fallen down, leaving the site unprotected.

Councillor Eldred King said, in his opinion, the responsibility rested solely with the parents to keep their children off private lands, and not with the owner to safeguard his premises against accidents that could occur.

Councillor Cathy Joyce disagreed. She argued that where a hazard was known to exist, some means should be taken to correct it. She said the pond, in her opinion, was every bit as dangerous and in need of safeguards, as a private swimming pool.

Council agreed to write the owner and warn him of the hazard. It was also agreed that the

householder's complaint should be submitted to Council in writing.
