Dear Editor:
I agree with Elva Dean (Editor's Mail Mar. 29, 1973).

The whole question of library service in Whitchurch-Stouffville has been taken too lightly by too many people. We need a new library.

Some of us apparently feel that because our public schools have libraries, we need not offer our children public library service. This is a very poor judgment. A school library accumulates a highly specialized book collection centred around the interests and activities of that particular school. In this situation, public library facilities become extremely important to supplement and complement the schools' collections.

There have been suggestions that we

combine public and school library facilities within one of the school libraries. There is a very slim chance that this would work. It would require extra staff, equipment and books and other materials. Ideally, it would also require that school librarians abandon scheduled library classes and open their facilities to all children, all day as does a public library. I fail to see the local school philosophy tolerating such freedom of action.

Librarians Doris Lapp and Barbara Smith are working hard to create the kind of library facilities our citizens of all ages will enjoy. Besides their being appreciated and praised, it

is time they received some solid support in their efforts to expand the facilities and range of materials.

Any proposal for a new library will involve expense, and lots of it. As a taxpayer and a parent, I feel the expense is going to return me dividends in the form of the future intellectual development of my child's library.

In 1973, libraries are not dingy caverns given over only to the storage and classification of books. They are comfortable, interesting centres of communication where the past, present and future meet, where people learn and create, using materials ranging from

books to living animals to audio-visual materials. Our Town library should be able to offer any and all of these things to children and adults.

Certainly, the citizens who will benefit most by a new library are those who are in the learning process. To me, that means everyone — for if you are not learning, you are dead.

I hope that other parents in Whitchurch-Stouffville will support the final plan for a new separate public library in any and every way they can. Whether you actually ever open the library door or not, you are affected, in the long run, by the quality of your public library facilities.
