STOUFFVILLE — Barry Stather, 580 Elm Road, Stouffville, knows the frustrations of "keeping his ride," or having his car hold up so that he can put together a successful year of winning. Last Saturday, Barry was off to Pinecrest Speedway with a new car to start the 1973 Racing Season. Sunday morning found him and friends putting it all back together again after an ill-timed "spinout," by another driver forced Barry into a pile-up. Sixty dollars damage; sixty dollars won; and hours of labor to get the machine back in shape.

During the past winter, the sleek orange and white racing machine was "constructed." The only recognizable feature of the entire car is the Chevelle body. Everything else is new. The total cost in in the neighborhood of eight thousand dollars. Stather spends about 21 hours per

week on this past-time. Last year, after five weeks of competition, he was forced to quit racing because his costs were too high and his winnings too low. Looking at the torn down auto, Stather quipped: "If this keeps up, I'll quit again."

There are three tracks where Barry Stather; Stouffville's Murray Tustin and Howard DeGeer from Box Grove; compete. Pinecrest, Speedway, Flamboro and Cayuga. Pinecrest has the best money, but as Barry puts it: "You have to wreck your car to win." Cayuga has the biggest track, five eighths of a mile, and you can drive there all year without a scratch but there's no money.

The eight thousand dollars Stather won in 1971 still looms as the incentive to get his machine back in shape. He hasn't lost his 'ride' yet, just banged it up a bit.
