Barbara Garvin was taken first to York County Hospital at Newmarket and later transferred to the Toronto General.
According to police, Barbara and her parents started out from home in separate cars, but the victim's vehicle ran out of gas near the intersection

of Don Mills Road and the Mt. Albert-Sideroad. Percy Lloyd, a Sharon service station operator attempted to get the auto started, and when this failed, he agreed to push the car some distance along the highway. That's when the crash occurred.
In the meantime the girl's parents had proceeded on to the service, not knowing of their daughter's condition. They were informed later.

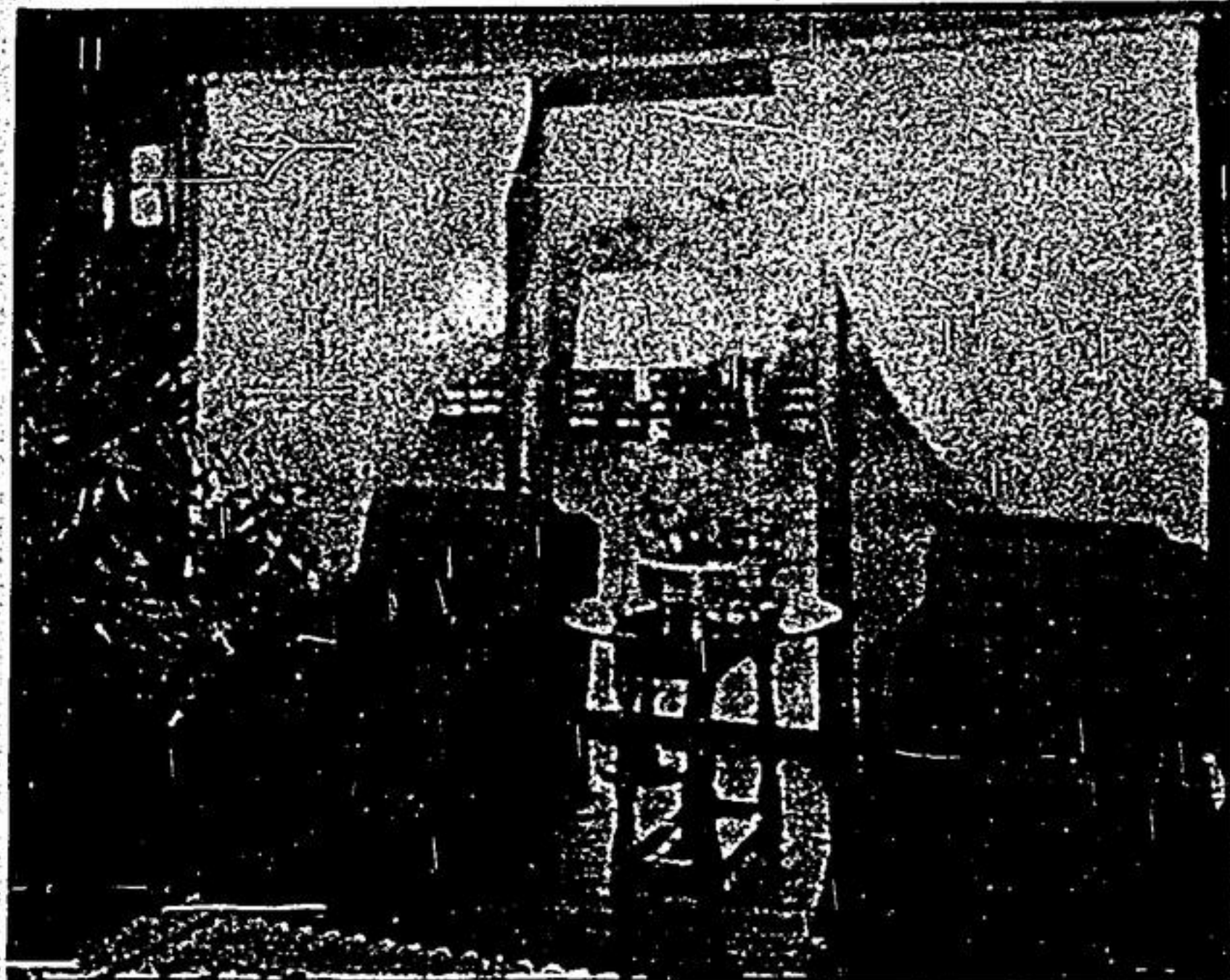
