

The Mayor Reports

From the Town

of Whitchurch-Stouffville

Question: Have you heard what the Department of Public Works intends to do with the old post office building when the facility is relocated? Is its re-use restricted through zoning?

Answer: We asked Public Works, on behalf of the Library Board, that we be given consideration when the old building is vacated. They informed us that we would be given first opportunity to purchase. The lot is zoned 'Open Space'. This means that the building could only continue its existing use as a public facility under municipal and Conservation Authority regulations. 'Open Space' lands follow the stream through the centre of Stouffville and it's the intention of the Town and the Authority that the stream be re-channelized with the next phase of residential development in Stouffville.

Question: What is your opinion of the new Administrative Committee that has been set up at the Regional level?

Answer: I think it's an excellent idea. The Committee, comprising the nine mayors of the Region's municipalities, will present to Regional council changes in policy, new programs, salary negotiations, and act as a buffer between department heads and council. I believe it will provide better liaison. The present method of dealing with administration has caused, at times, utter confusion at Regional meetings because of the abruptness in presenting programs. It also forces quick decisions on issues which are not researched enough.

Question: Do you anticipate that space in the municipal offices will be adequate for some time and do you foresee that 'administration' might ever become part of the library-sports complex presently being considered?


Answer: I can't see any reason why our present building would not fulfill the administrative needs of our Town for at least another ten years. There's still space not in use which could be converted into additional offices. With the trend to computers, which we already use for tax and water billing, the need for additional staff will be minimized. It is conceivable that if the municipal offices became obsolete in the distant future, they could be unified with a complex.


