## 21% no church attachment

STOUFFVILLE — A 2-month survey of religious opinion, conducted in the former village of Stouffville by locally based 'Vision International', has been evaluated on approximately five hundred responses to a standard questionnaire.

The survey revealed that 97 percent of those questioned had a Bible in their homes, mostly the King James' Version; 48 attended church regularly, 31 percent occasionally, and 21 percent, never; 37 percent belonged to the United Church, 15 percent — Missionary, 13 percent — Anglican; 9 percent — Baptist, 8 percent — Catholic, 4 percent — Presbyterian and Congregational, 2 percent — Pentecostal — and — Mennonite.
