## Town library facility inadequate

**STOUFFVILLE** — Space within the Whitechurch-Stouffville Public Library is so limited, Mrs. Doris Lapp told a meeting of ratepayers, June 13, that the public washroom is required for storage.

While the remark may have touched a humorous note with listeners, Mrs. Lapp, the Town's Librarian was serious. She pointed out that in planning a new facility, whether it be part of a complex or a building on its own, adequate storage should be regarded as top priority.

Mrs. Lapp said Whitechurch-Stouffville's new Library should be a minimum of 7,800 square feet to adequately serve the community. This, she observed, would be five times the floor area of the present structure.

She placed lighting and interior decor as high on the priority list also.

The Town's Library has 15,000 books available for circulation. This, she noted, was completely inadequate and should be increased by an additional 35,000.

Mrs. Lapp's presentation included slides, showing features offered in libraries at Chingacousy Township and King. Major facilities incorporated into these buildings included exhibit space, more accessible control desks, study corners, magazine and reading rooms, culture centres, an audio-visual centre, a record bar and a lounge.

The children's area, she said, should include an activity centre, a theatre and a functional reading room.

Completing the concept, she continued, would be a library staff work area, a librarian's office, a catalogue room, an administration area and a supply room. She also sees the need for a mobile library, that could cover the municipality. This, she agreed, could come some time in the future.

Right now, she concluded, the principal priority is to get on with a new building, on that will adequately serve all the people throughout all the Town.
