

Former teacher says

Years in one-room school were best

MARKHAM — From a teacher in a little one-room rural school at Boston, Ontario (Norfolk County), to a position of importance within the Ontario Dept. of Education; that has been the life of Thomas Archibald Campbell Leishman, better known as 'Tim', 34 Elm Street, Markham.

Now retired, Tim has more time to work around his home and 'live' with the memories of accomplishments and contributions through years past.

What chapter in his long career impressed him most? That's easy. The time he spent as a teacher in small country school at Boston, Ontario. "The greatest two years in my life," he says. He had 56 students in all eight grades and earned \$600 a year. "Sometimes I feel I should have stayed a teacher," he reminisces.

Through the Ministry of Education, Tim Leishman helped establish the Adult Education Board in 1946. A year later, he joined the staff of the Community Programs Branch, Dept.

of Education, and moved from Sudbury to London. He later worked out of Toronto and moved to Markham 20 years ago, where he's continued to reside ever since.

Much of Mr. Leishman's time has been spent up North, working closely with new Canadians and the Indians. He helped pioneer a basic English course for Polish night schools at convenient locations, including farms and lumber camps. He looks on Indians as "first class citizens", but feels they've been treated too paternally by government bodies. Prior to his retirement, he served as secretary-treasurer on the Board of Governors, Mosonee

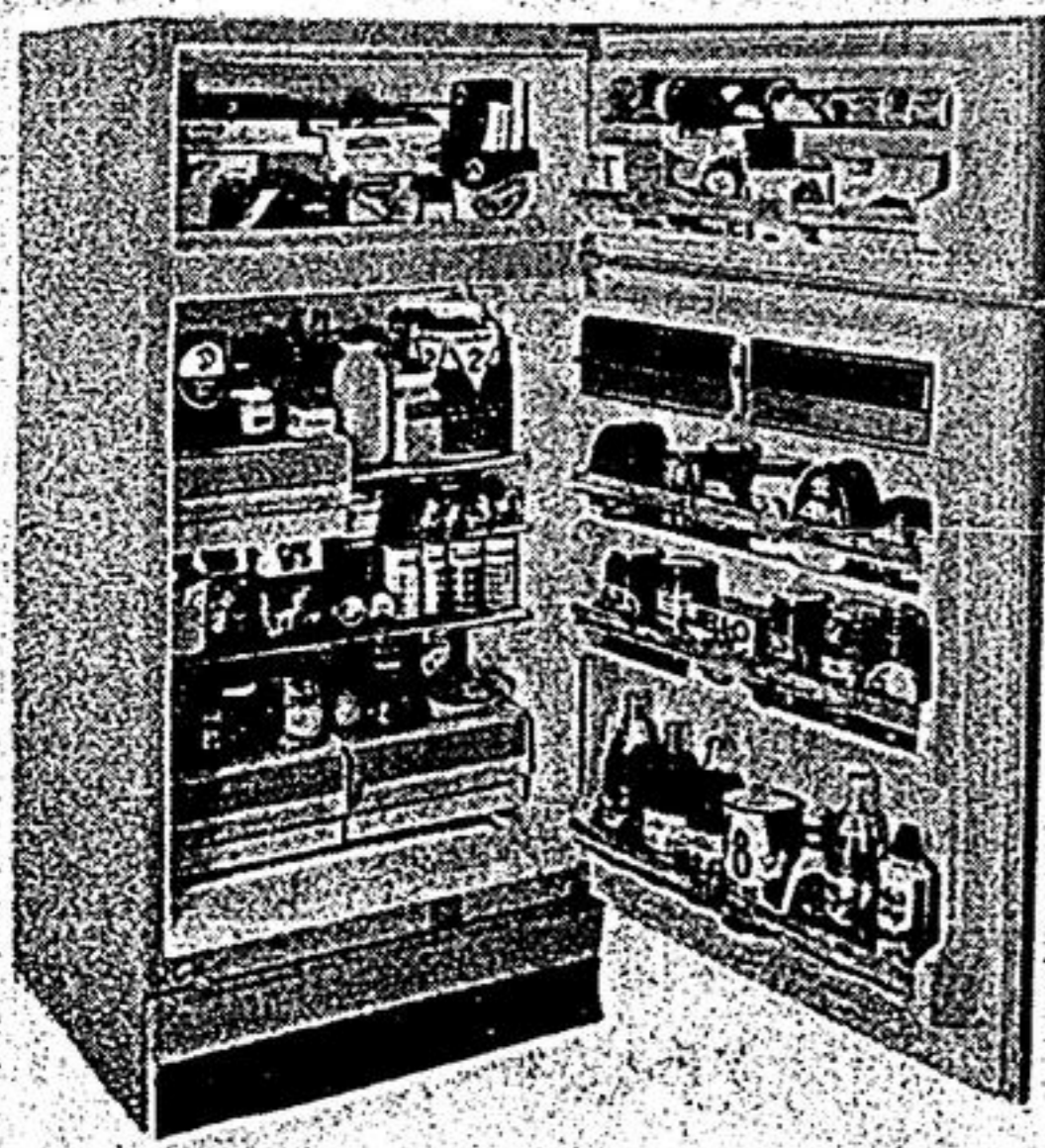
