STOUFFVILLE — Performing against some of the top fastball teams in Ontario, the Stouffville 'Credit Union' Squirts won 3 and lost 1 in all-day tournament at Woodstock, July 21.

Stouffville's lone defeat was a 7-0 shutout by Sarnia. In games to follow, they downed Woodstock, 10-6; beat Stratford, 5-2 and bombed Beamsville, 20-1.

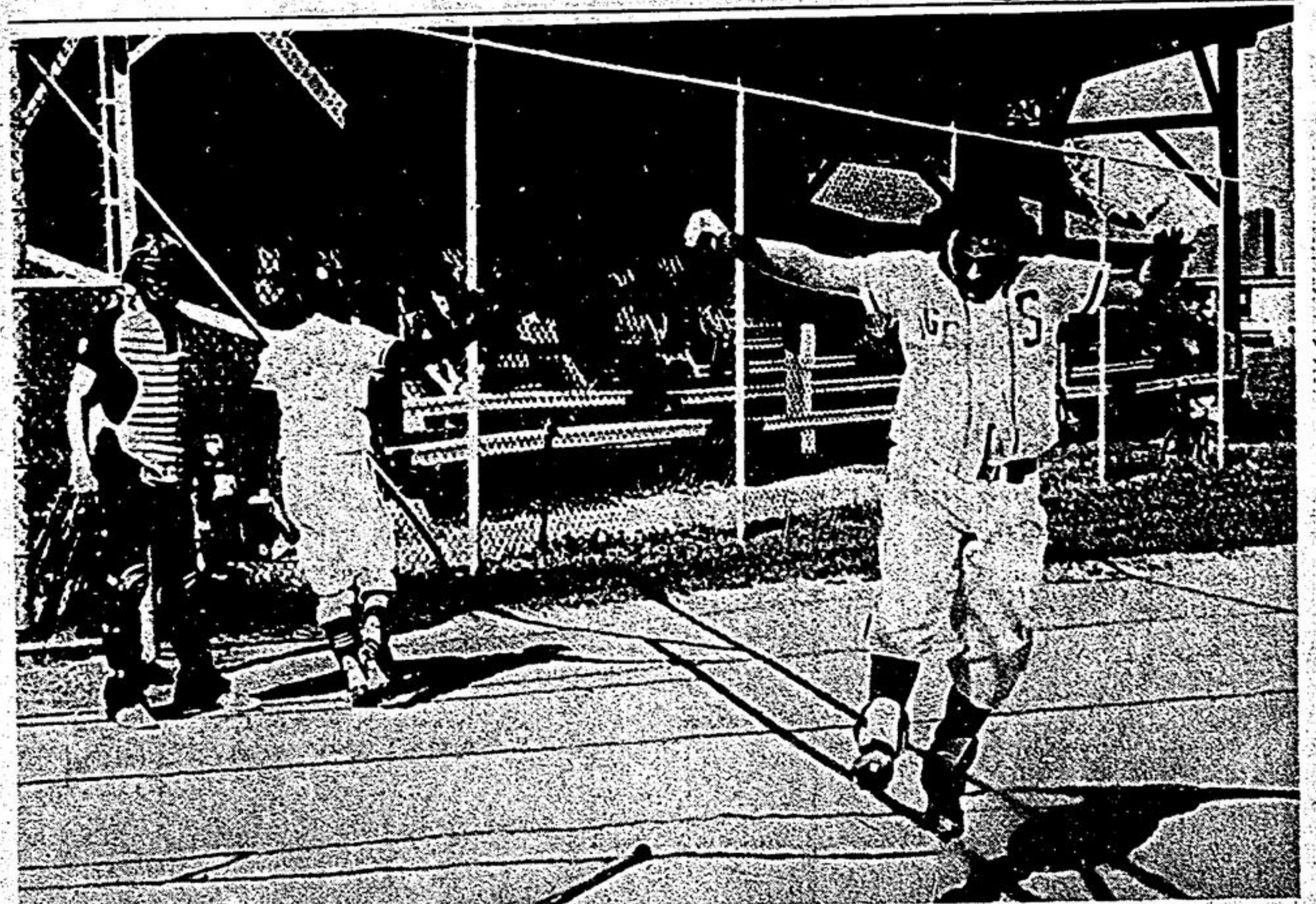

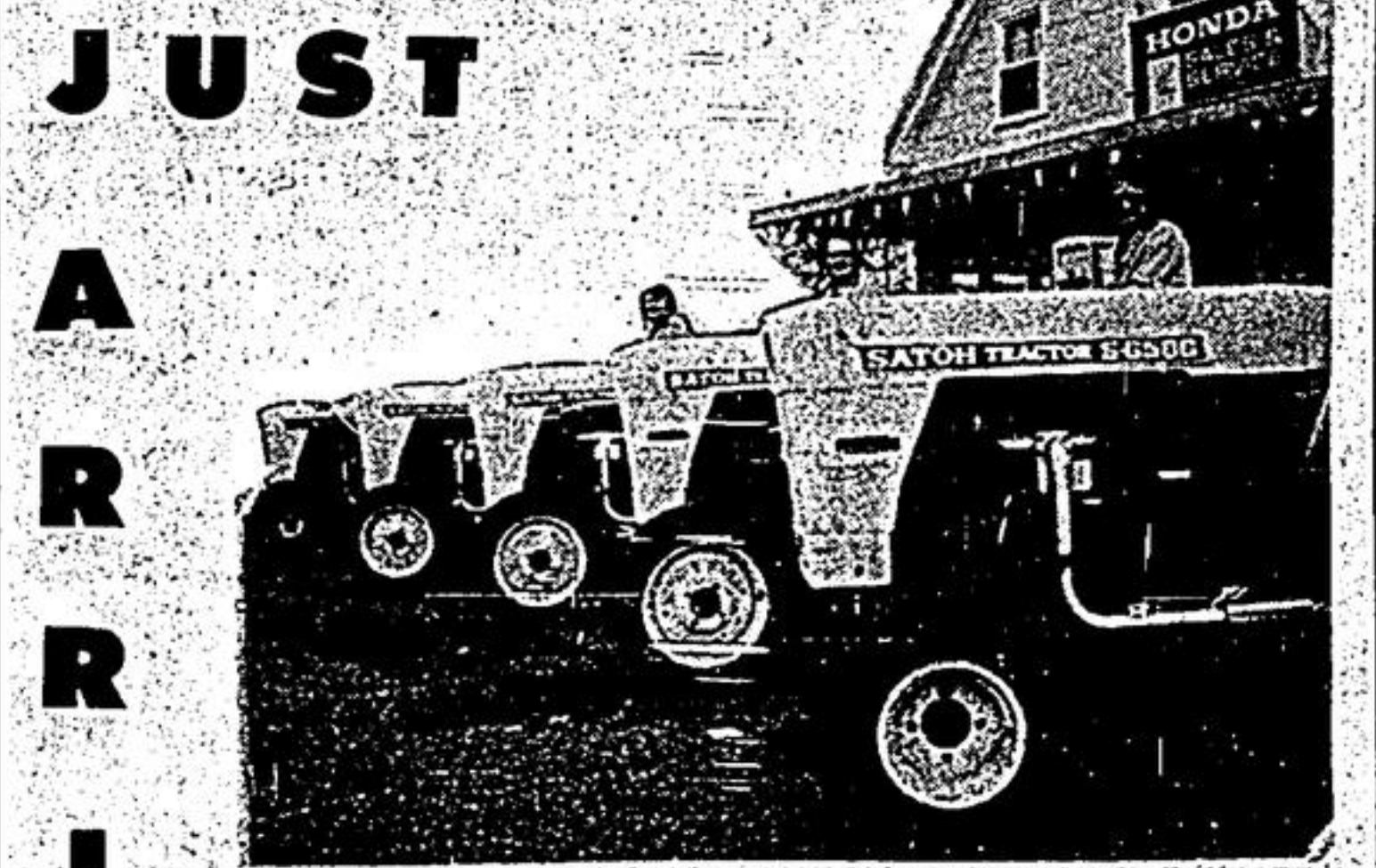
Consequently, Stouffville is allowed a "bye" into the second round, where they will meet the winner of the series now going between Whitby and Willowdale.
