Honor individual athletes

STOUFFVILLE — On a recommendation from committee member Jim Thomas, the Whitchurch-Stouffville Recreation Association has approved a policy whereby all residents attaining a high standard of individual accomplishment, will be recognized for his or her achievement.

In putting forward the suggestion, the member observed that team champions had been recognized by Council, but individuals who were every bit as deserving, had been ignored. He mentioned several such persons who had attained outstanding success in provincial and international competition.

"Through their

efforts, this Town gains excellent publicity," he said, "surely, they're deserving of at least a letter".

Councillor Cathy Joyce agreed, saying that a set amount should be established in the 1974 budget to provide each person with a memento or plaque. "With team sports," she said, "there are so many people involved that their accomplishments are pushed into the foreground, while others who go it alone, are neglected". She felt Recreation Committee should take on this task rather than leave it to Council. "After all," she said, "our interest is recreation and that's what this is all about".

WHITCHURCH — Frank Kennedy of R.R. 3, Newmarket, the main 'push' behind the organization the Whitchurch-Stouffville House League program, has submitted his resignation, effective at the conclusion of the current season.

The group now includes six divisions and close to 500 players.

In announcing Mr. Kennedy's decision, at a meeting of the Whitchurch-Stouffville Recreation Committee, Aug. 15, Mrs. Ruth Warden praised the work he had done during the past three years. "It's unbelievable," she said, "he shouldered the whole burden". Mrs. Warden said two or three persons

had been recommended to fill the post, but no decision had been finalized.

Calf vs. cowboy in rodeo roping contest

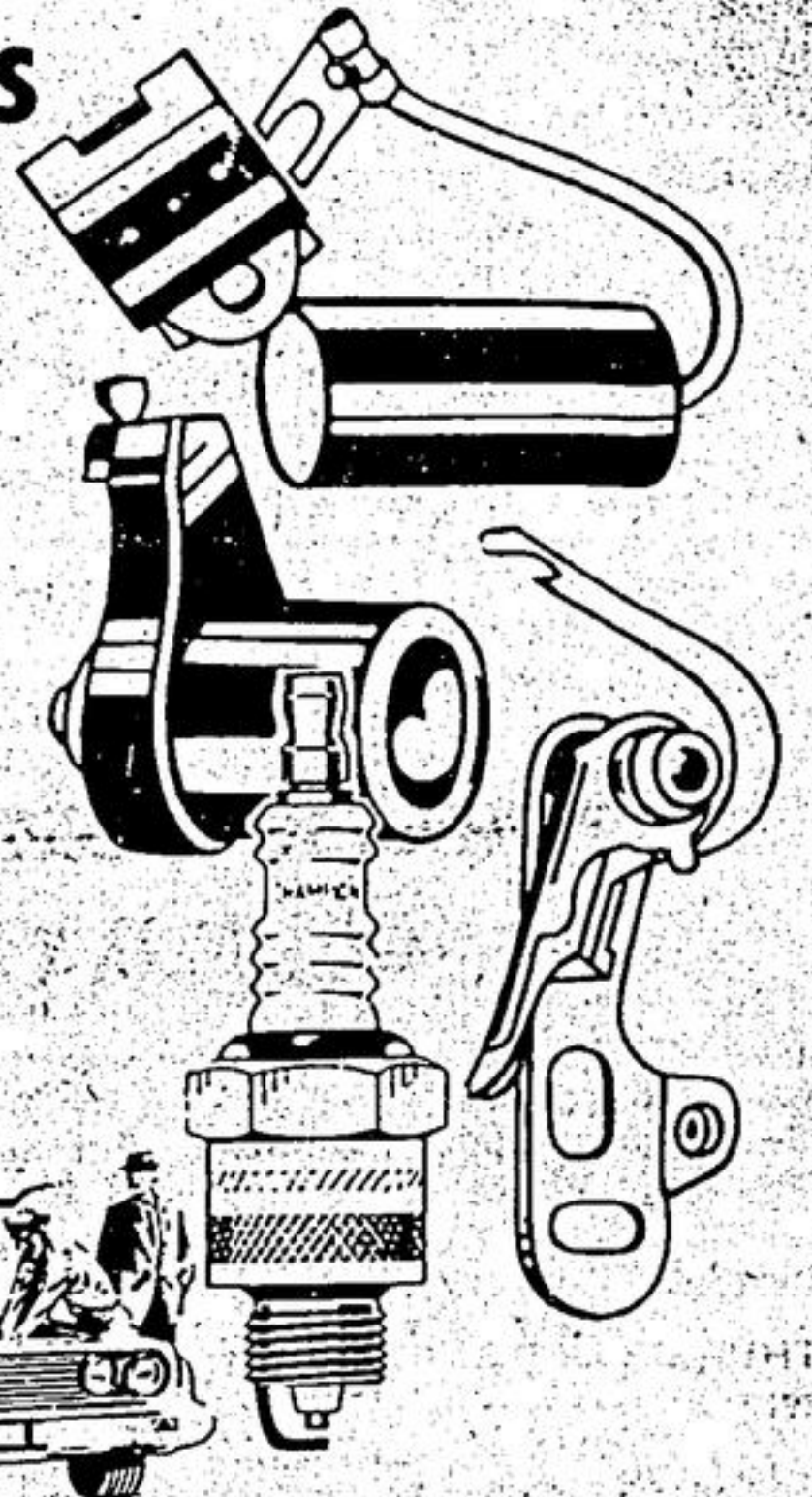
Eighty-nine cowboys and cowgirls from across the province, competed for \$2,000 in prize money, on the weekend, at Nor-Al Acres,
