Hire skating pro

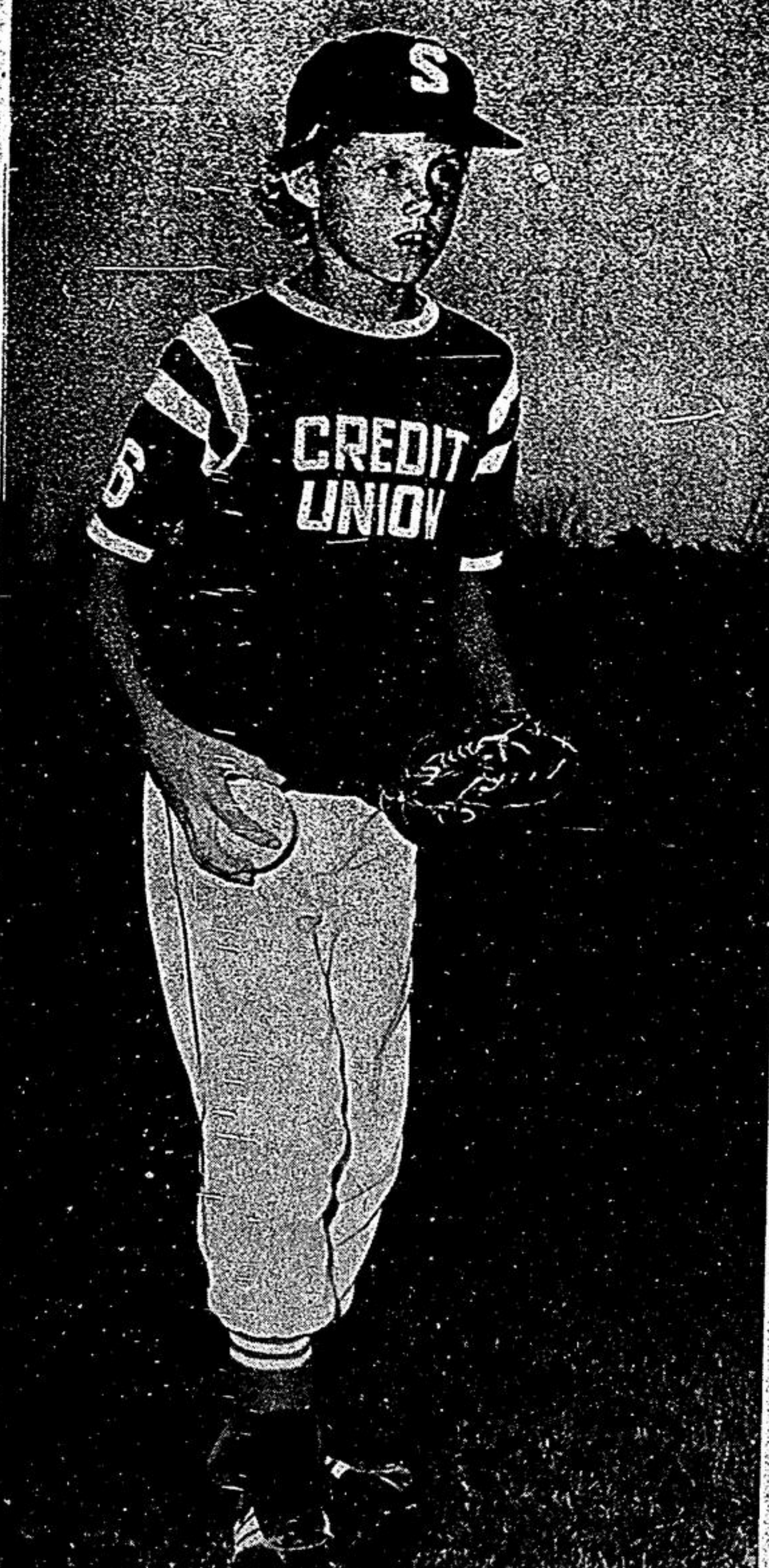
