The show ran for three days. The Fashion Parade on Saturday evening, the Kinsmen with their beef draw and the Lions with their corn provided the only action and incentive.

By all rules of show-biz it should have folded the first night. There's no way the lustreless exhibition of trade should be linked with the merry word 'Fair' - not even as a rating.
