Late George Storey Former clerk was Stouffville native

STOUFFVILLE - A link with Stouffville's past has been lost in the death, Sept. 29, of George J. Storey, a native resident of the town and former village.

Mr. Storey passed away in Brierbush Hospital at the age of 84.

He possessed a vivid memory of the Stouffville that used to be and was one of the few who could reflect on community life as he knew it in the early 1900's.

One of his closest friends was K. Ross Davis, Church Street. He often recalled how the two would go swimming in the creek or strike off on fishing trip to nearby streams. He often referred to those times as "the good old days".

George Storey was an employee on the staff of the old Standard Bank, located on the site of the present Commerce branch. He earned \$12.50 per month.

Later, he entered the municipal service where he remained almost 30 years, including a span of 15 years as clerk-treasurer.

He could recall when Stouffville's municipal water system was installed at a cost of \$30,000 and the consumer rate was \$2 a year.

George Storey was keenly interested in sports, particularly lacrosse when rivalry between area towns was at a peak.

Surviving, besides his wife, the former Harriet Ratcliff, is one brother, J. M. (Milton), also of Stouffville.

Rev. Gordon Gooderham, conducted the service, Tuesday, at 2:30 p.m., from the O'Neill Funeral Home, Stouffville, with interment, Stouffville Cemetery. The pall bearers were Glenn Ratcliff, Clifford Loney, Delos Matheson, Kenneth Klink, Frank Burkholder and Wesley Storey.

A respected lady

MARKHAM - Mrs. Sabina Thomson, a longtime resident and highly esteemed senior citizen of the Markham community passed away peacefully at her home, September 28.

The daughter of Suzanna and George Tran, she was born on Dec. 10, at Mongolia, 91 years ago.

Following her marriage in 1903, Mrs. Thomson lived in Clarendon with her husband, Walter, who was a baker by trade. They took up residence in Markham a few years after, on purchasing premises on Main Street which they operated as the Markham Bakery. The business was sold in 1914 when the Thomsons moved to the U.S.A. They settled near Billings, Montana, but returned in 1921 to re-purchase the

Bakery and establish their home and business on Markham Main Street once more.

Mrs. Thomson served, and assisted her husband in the bakeshop until they retired in 1930 to property in the Village which was later appropriately named, for the benefit of postal delivery, Thomson Court.

Always energetic, Mrs. Thomson continued, despite her age, to tackle her own housework and take an active interest in local functions. She was a Charter Member of the Markham Order of the Eastern Star and, up until a few months ago, attended meetings regularly.

The local Order paid last respects to its respected member at a special service held from the Dixon Funeral Home, Sunday evening. Her

pastor, Rev. Donald Parr of St. Andrew's United Church, was in charge, Oct. 1, with interment, Elmwood Cemetery.

Pall bearers were grandsons, Bob Burkholder, Jack Rennie, John and Dick Todds, Peter Fry and Hilary Richards.

Mrs. Thomson is survived by daughters Muriel (Mrs. Russ Burkholder) Belleville, Nureen (Mrs. Fred Todds) Montreal, Mrs. Marion Rennie, Markham; Doris (Mrs. Arthur Fry) Woodstock; two sisters, Ida (Mrs. Wm. Maxwell) Markham; Fannie (Mrs. E. D. Sharp), Sheridan, Wyoming; one brother, David Tran of Stouffville; nine grandchildren and eighteen great grandchildren.
