

Signals wanted for dangerous corner

COPPINS CORNERS — People here wince and hold their breath when they hear the blast of a truck air-horn.

They've learned to expect tragedy after two fatal truck-car crashes in the past month where County Road 1A crosses Brock Road north of Clarendon.

Despite improvements to the road last summer, over-sized stop signs with flashing lights on 1A, and a reduced speed limit on the Brock Road, the accident rate is alarmingly high.

Lynda Cook is frightened by the corner she lives near. She worries that something might happen while a school bus is loading at the corner or that an out-of-control vehicle might cause an explosion by colliding with the pumps at a local filling station. Fog has been a factor in some of the accidents. The corner, because it is surrounded on all sides by hills, is one of the last areas to clear.

Mrs. Cook says it is difficult to cross the Brock Road because of the heavy traffic.

A neighbor, Jackie Fort agreed, pointing out that this summer cars were often backed up a mile, waiting to cross. "You should see the risks people take," she said.

Mary Tyndale does not blame the accidents on the gravel trucks that rear up and down Brock. The accidents would happen anyway. "It just happens; this is a truck area," she says.

Trucks were involved in both fatalities but only

one was a gravel truck using the road regularly. Both accidents occurred when a vehicle either ignored or failed to yield at the stop sign on 1A.

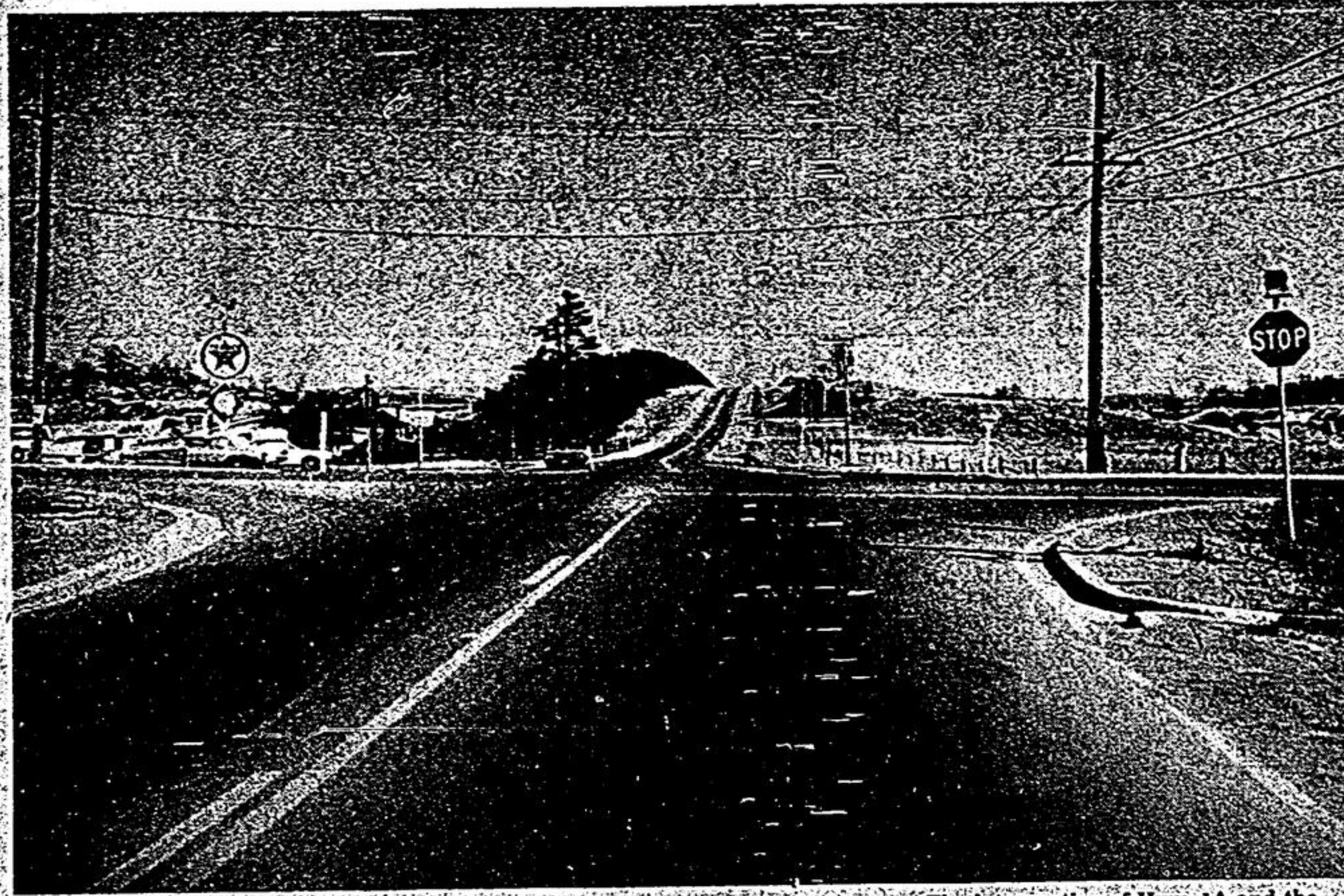
The Ontario Provincial Police now have cars on the Brock Road everyday checking speed limits and watching that people obey the stop sign, press officer Wayne Nethery said recently.

But area residents don't think that's enough. Two petitions have been circulated calling for traffic lights.

Ontario County maintenance engineer Jack McCorkell said that traffic counts will be conducted this week and the roads committee will discuss lights at their meeting Nov. 7.

Signals serve a purpose but if people are ignoring the stop sign will they ignore the signals?" he wondered.

"It's silly not to put in lights if they'll help even if they only prevent a couple accidents," said Mrs. Tyndale.

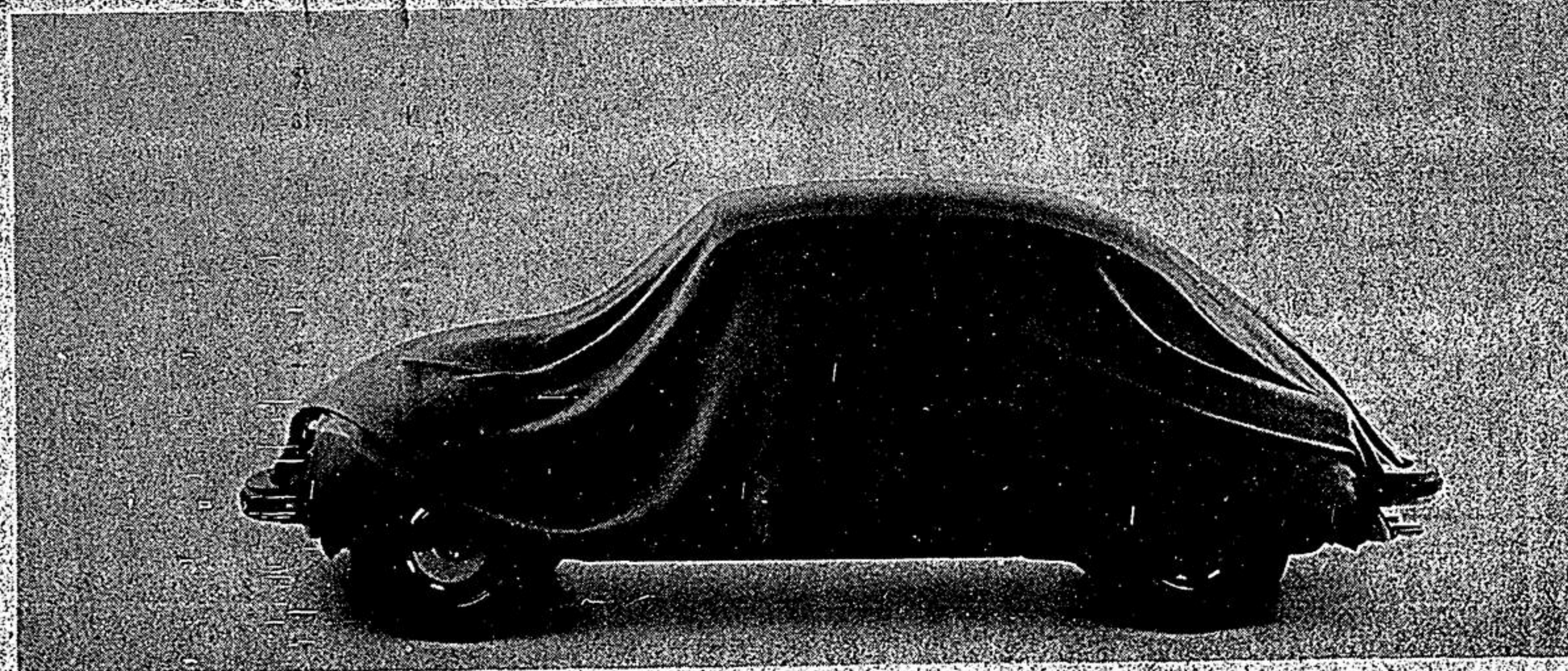
