4-H Clubs went well this year with 179 4-H exhibits shown at our fairs and 370 members completing the full program. Club shows at Sutton, Markham and Woodbridge were tops. The 4-H horse club show at Woodbridge made the

best progress with 19 members in the ring at once with their horses. David Snider and Dan Fieldhouse were important winners, coming first in the senior and junior sections of the Holstein Club competition. Tim Henshaw won the beef competition for all members.

The Sutton Club had awards presented last week with Cathy Comer winning the top award. Other winners were Joey Robinson, Terry Winch, Susan Travis and Jim Locke.

Well over a 100 members will be guests this week at a Royal York luncheon sponsored by the Toronto Kiwanis Club. Ken Dryden, former goalkeeper for Team Canada and the Montreal Canadiens, will be the guest speaker. Members will visit the Winter Fair in the afternoon.

The biggest 4-H show at the Royal will be the Queen's Guinness competition for beef calves on Friday. Thirteen members for York will show including Mary Charpentier, Cathy and Connie Comer, Mary Robert and Zella Dike, Grant Harrison, Tim Henshaw, Brian Jordan,

Craig and Dan Massey, Blair Smith and Jane Yusko.

Some of our members will also be in the showmanship competitions in the Holstein and Guernsey shows.

Our best single achievement is that one of our 4-H Homemaking Club members is representing Ontario at National 4-H Club week. Marjorie Diceman of Woodbridge was selected as one of ten members from Ontario and she is spending a full week of activities with members from all provinces in Canada.
