What's going on Four injured in crash

RINGWOOD — One woman was taken to hospital and three other people sustained minor injuries in a rear end collision on Highway 48 north of Ringwood Saturday afternoon.

A pickup truck driven by Russell Hayes, 33 of Toronto was northbound on Highway 48 and attempting to make a left-hand turn into a private driveway, when a car, driven by John Harrison, 46, of Scarboro, slammed into the rear of the Hayes truck. Constance Harrison, a passenger in the car, was taken to Scarboro Centenary Hospital with facial injuries.

Mr. Hayes, Murray Lewis, 28 of Stouffville and Donald Bell, 35 of Stouffville, all occupants of the truck, received minor injuries.

Total damage was estimated at \$1,200 and Mr. Harrison has been charged with careless driving.

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My Fair Ladies . . .

Oh, it can be such a burden
And it takes a lot of care;
But there is no crowning glory
Like the glory of long hair.

If you're scissor-shy, if you just can't bear to part with your waist-long locks, don't!

But if you value your long hair, protect it, cherish it, guard it carefully. A short hair that becomes damaged will be gone in a few months. But a long hair must last and last.

Needs lots of special care
Hair grows about 6 inches a year. If you want your hair to be 30 inches long (a nice length!) each hair must grow for a good five years. Five years of sun, five years of cold, five years of washing, drying, brushing, combing and just plain exposure.

So long hair must be pampered and preserved. Treat each hair as though it were to last forever.

Bind your hair loosely, never use rubber bands, avoid anything (barrettes with rough edges, etc.) that might break your precious hair. Never brush your hair when wet — and when it's wet, comb it with the greatest care starting at the ends and then working your way up. And never wash your hair without using a conditioner or cream rinse.

Of course you must brush your hair. Use a natural bristle oval brush (the half-rounds and spirals tend to break long hair) and brush with flat strokes (no twisting) from back to front.

Many women complain that their hair "just won't grow" or won't grow past a certain point. But more often than not, the problem is not that their hair won't grow, but that the growing hair keeps on breaking.
