**Farm Report**

**Women prominent  
at farm affairs  
business meeting**

Our meeting on farm business affairs went quite well at Belhaven last week and Sharon this week. There were lots of farm wives at both meetings, and not surprisingly, they were just as interested in taxes, financing, records, and farm business agreements as the men.

It was good to have professional people in on the discussions. Accountants David Huntley and Ron Leggatt both from Newmarket, and bankers Cliff Shewfeldt and Vern Platt were all most helpful along with Doug Miles, our farm management specialist.

The new special provisions for family farms in capital gains tax, succession duties, and gift taxes, have changed the approach to the set-up of a farm business. Previously, it was important to have either a partnership or be incorporated so that increases in the value of assets could be directed more to the younger operators. It was fairly difficult to get these things going, and the need now isn't as great with everyone in the family.

the tax deferrals that are possible and the once-in-a-lifetime gift tax exemption of \$50,000.

The move now is to have an operating agreement for a farm family, with the income shared, and with the assets owned individually by each of the participants. It's not the best idea in the world, but it is easy to set up, simple to operate, and can be terminated without any serious problems.

We cover the job of keeping adequate records at these meetings too. It's harping away at a very old subject but interest in getting an easy-to-follow system going, is improving steadily. There are several alternatives, but one point common to them all is that the best starting time is now.

The series moves next week to Victoria Square — Feb. 4, 5 and 7 — and to King City the following week, Feb. 11, 12 and 14. The first day is taxes, the second is on credit and farm accounting, and Family Business Arrangements are on the third day.

The meetings start each day at 1:30, finish at 3:30 and they are for everyone in the family.
