Fined \$200

UNIONVILLE — "You've been before this court so often, I'm concerned about you. Mostly, it's been for liquor offences. People deteriorate from the effects of alcohol and sometimes become violent. When this happens, that person must be put away."

These were the comments of Judge Russell Pearce after registering a conviction against 29-year-old John Blundell in Richmond Hill Provincial Court.

The accused had pleaded guilty to a charge of possessing a weapon dangerous to the public peace.

Evidence revealed Blundell had entered private residence but was told to leave. This he did only to return, carrying a shotgun. He was arrested later, with the gun still in his possession. It wasn't loaded.


Blundell was fined \$200 and placed on probation for two years. Terms include abstaining from use of alcohol, prohibited from possessing or using weapons, barred from entering premises where beer or liquor are sold, prohibited from using illegal drugs or narcotics, and to stay away from the premises where the offense occurred.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

A public meeting will be held by the Planning Board of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to discuss the following proposed Official Plan amendments, whereby it is the intent of Council to:

- Consider proposed amendment No. 51 to the Official Plan of the Township of Markham, now in the Whitchurch-Stouffville planning area, which changes the land use designation from "Rural" to "Industrial" on lands described as part of lot 35, concession 8. The subject site, consisting of approximately 20 acres, has a frontage of 759 feet on the south side of Highway No. 47 and abuts the westerly boundary of the former Village of Stouffville.
- Consider proposed amendment No. 4 to the Official Plan of the Township of Whitchurch, now in the Whitchurch-Stouffville planning area, which changes the land use designation from "Rural" to "Industrial" on lands described as part of lot 4, concession 4. The subject site, 50 feet X 100 feet, is located on the northwest corner of the intersection of the Bethesda Sideroad and the 5th Concession Road. A vacant church building is located on the site.

You are invited to attend the meeting and to state your support or objection to the proposed amendments. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting. The amending documents may be examined at the clerk's office, Municipal Building, Stouffville, during regular business hours.

Scout camp — a benefit

STOUFFVILLE — In January, Council rejected a request from the Boy Scouts organization of Greater Toronto Region for a \$599 grant to cover the building permit for an Adult Training facility at its Woodland Trails Camp in Whitchurch-Stouffville. During discussion of the request, it was reported that the Camp had already received a \$12,000 Federal grant and local cub-scout groups were given no special priorities of use at the site.

A letter sent to the Mayor last week by D. K. Russell, chairman of the Adult Training Building Committee, set the record straight for the benefit of Council, and for members of the community who may have gathered from a Tribune report, Feb. 7, that Woodland Trails Camp was not playing fair to local scout groups.

The writer did not suggest that the Toronto Region request be reconsidered but expressed concern that the Tribune article indicated Council was not aware of the Camp's participation in the community. For the past eight years, reported Mr. Russell, the 1st Lemonville Group has held its meetings, free of charge, at the Camp and the Ballantrae troop similarly permitted use of the area for day or evening outings. The Camp had also given free temporary accommodation to two neighborhood families whose homes had been destroyed by fire. Mr. Russell submitted, "We are trying to be good corporate citizens" and pointed out the Federal L.I.P. grant was being used to finance the clearance of land and erection of fences around the property, work which gave employment to local persons.

In response to the letter, councillor Jim Wong reiterated his support of the scouting program and attempted to reverse Council's previous ruling on the requested grant. No one disputed that the Scouts were very worthy of support but, it was generally concluded, a municipal grant to the Woodland Trails Camp would set a precedent and precipitate similar requests from other camp operations in the municipality.


