


New members installed by Lions Club

Top officials' salaries approved by York Region

YORK REGION — The 1974 salaries for York Region department heads were confirmed last week.

Some regional council members objected to the raises and a recorded vote was called for by Mayor Evelyn Buck of Aurora. She and three other councillors voted against the raises.

All of the department heads will receive raises retroactive to Jan. 1 and on April 1 will receive a one-cent increase in mileage payments bringing it to 16 cents a mile.

Some department heads received a straight 9 percent increase, and others received this plus an additional amount.

The commissioner of engineering received 9 per cent plus additional \$840 bringing his salary to \$28,000 per year.

Chief Administrative officer, Jack Rettie, now makes \$40,500 as compared to \$38,000 in 1973. Mr. Rettie is the highest paid department head.

The Regional Clerk is the lowest paid with a raise from \$21,500 to \$24,500.

Formerly, the region paid 75 per cent of the Ontario Health Insurance and Group Insurance but according to the new terms, these will be completely paid for.

Need place to meet

CLAREMONT — Conversion of the Claremont Lawn Bowling Club clubhouse into a year-round senior citizens meeting place could bring a revival in that sport, Recreation Director David Bass told Pickering Executive Committee.

The committee granted the senior citizens use of the clubhouse for five years and an offer to renew the contract for a further five years. The oldsters are presently preparing an application for a New Horizons grant to renovate the building for use in winter.

Ernie Baker, moving force behind the project, said the 60 senior citizens have been meeting in an old barbershop for a number of years but feel the clubhouse would be more suitable as it is not used during the winter months.

The agreement with the town stipulates that the lawn bowling facilities will be available to any Pickering resident who wishes to join.

The project's success now hinges on Federal approval for the New Horizons grant to complete the work.

Bus service costs taxpayers \$86,409

PICKERING — Pickering's dial-a-bus system will cost the taxpayers of that town \$86,409 for its first year of operation, council learned at a recent meeting.

Pickering Council passed a motion requesting the provincial government pay its share of \$38,089. The province pays 50 per cent of the operating deficit of public transit, to a ceiling that for Pickering is \$41,577, and also contributes 75 per cent of the cost of capital equipment.

The town pays an operating deficit of \$67,566 and its share of capital costs totalling \$18,843. Executive Committee members contemplated higher costs for 1974 due to increased service and is petitioning the province for increased subsidies.

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
