As Doug Feasby goes so go town Midgets

STOUFFVILLE — The over-confidence, so obvious in Stouffville's performance against Woodbridge in the first game of the Ontario Midget semi-finals, was noticeably absent when the two teams hooked up here, Monday.

Absent also was a lopsided goals-against figure on the scoreboard. They lost last Thursday, 6-3, but won, Monday, 6-2. They also grabbed a 6-1 victory on Woodbridge ice, Friday.

"Somebody got the bright idea this Woodbridge club was a push-over," said coach Jack Watson, following Monday's contest. "They're not; they're a good-passing, tough-checking team."

"We were skating out there to-night, and we stayed away from a lot of stupid penalties," he continued. He praised the performance of Doug Feasby's line, including wingers Dave (Moses) Mumford and Pete Fitzpatrick. "Doug (Feasby) was passing the puck better," he said, "a lot better than in the first game. That's what it takes. No one player can do it alone."

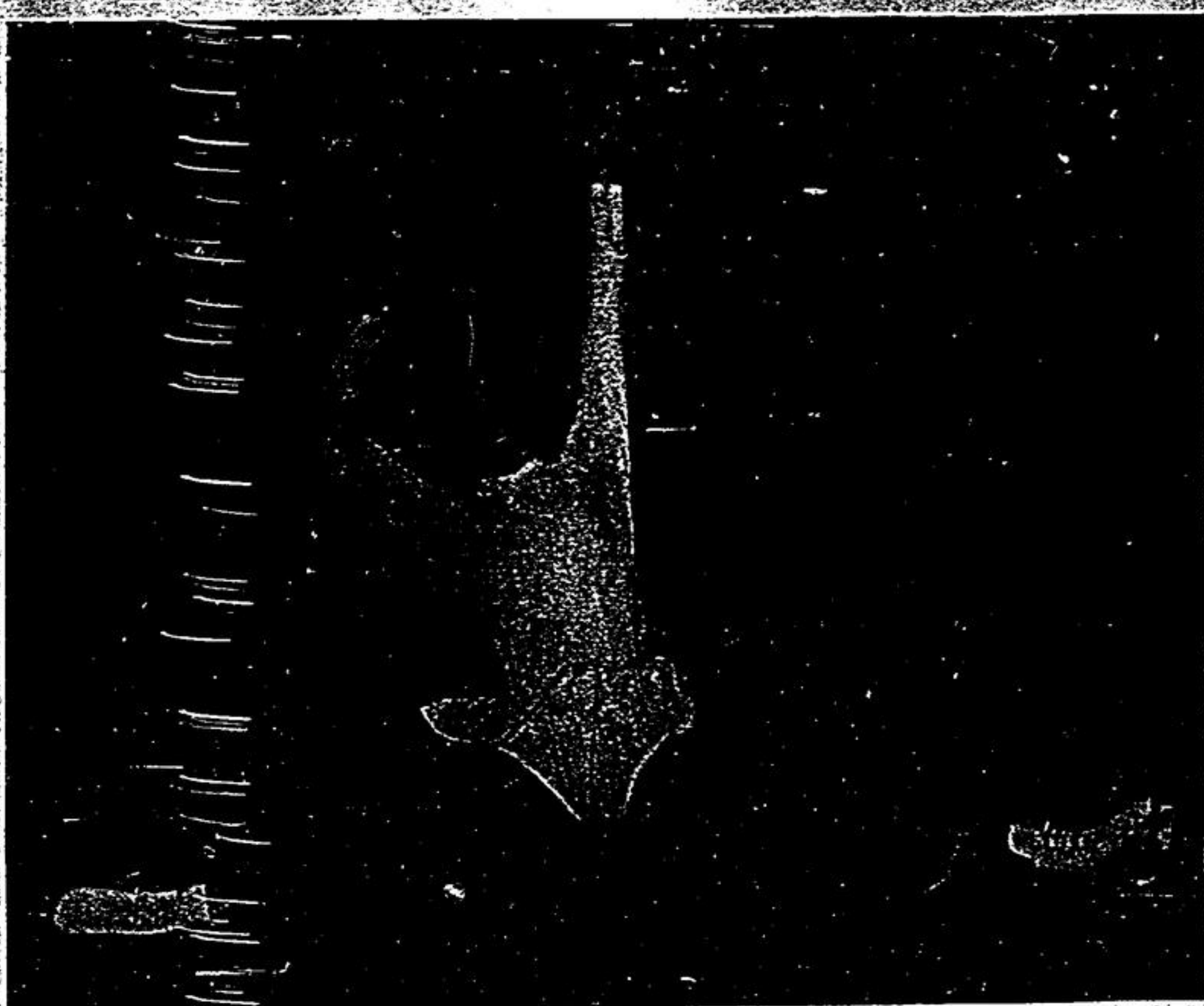
Rowsell, was the winner of the first event in the second draw and scored the most points to win the overall trophy in the 16-rink event.
