Apathy gone

YORK-CENTRE - Public apathy related to education in York County's secondary schools and the trustees that control it, is at an end. This is the feeling of Don Deacon, M.P.P., York-Centre, the result of the prolonged teachers' strike, now over. "The Board members will discover renewed interest and concern as they strive to correct defects and re-build morale," he says. "With the teachers returning to classrooms Monday, and the conflict nearing a conclusion," Mr. Deacon points to other battles still to be fought. "One of these is the proposed Airport. Expropriation or derelict appear to involve needless and senseless destruction of communities and irreplaceable agricultural land," he goes on. "A third troublesome is the proposed Parkway corridor, says the local M.P.P. where residents are battling for fair compensation rather than bear the full cost of providing much-needed greenbelt space. "There seems to be no end of conflict caused by the shortsighted approach we find frequently adopted by government," he continues. Mr. Deacon commends those who accept responsibility and voice their protests often at great personal sacrifice. "They deserve our understanding and support," he concludes.
