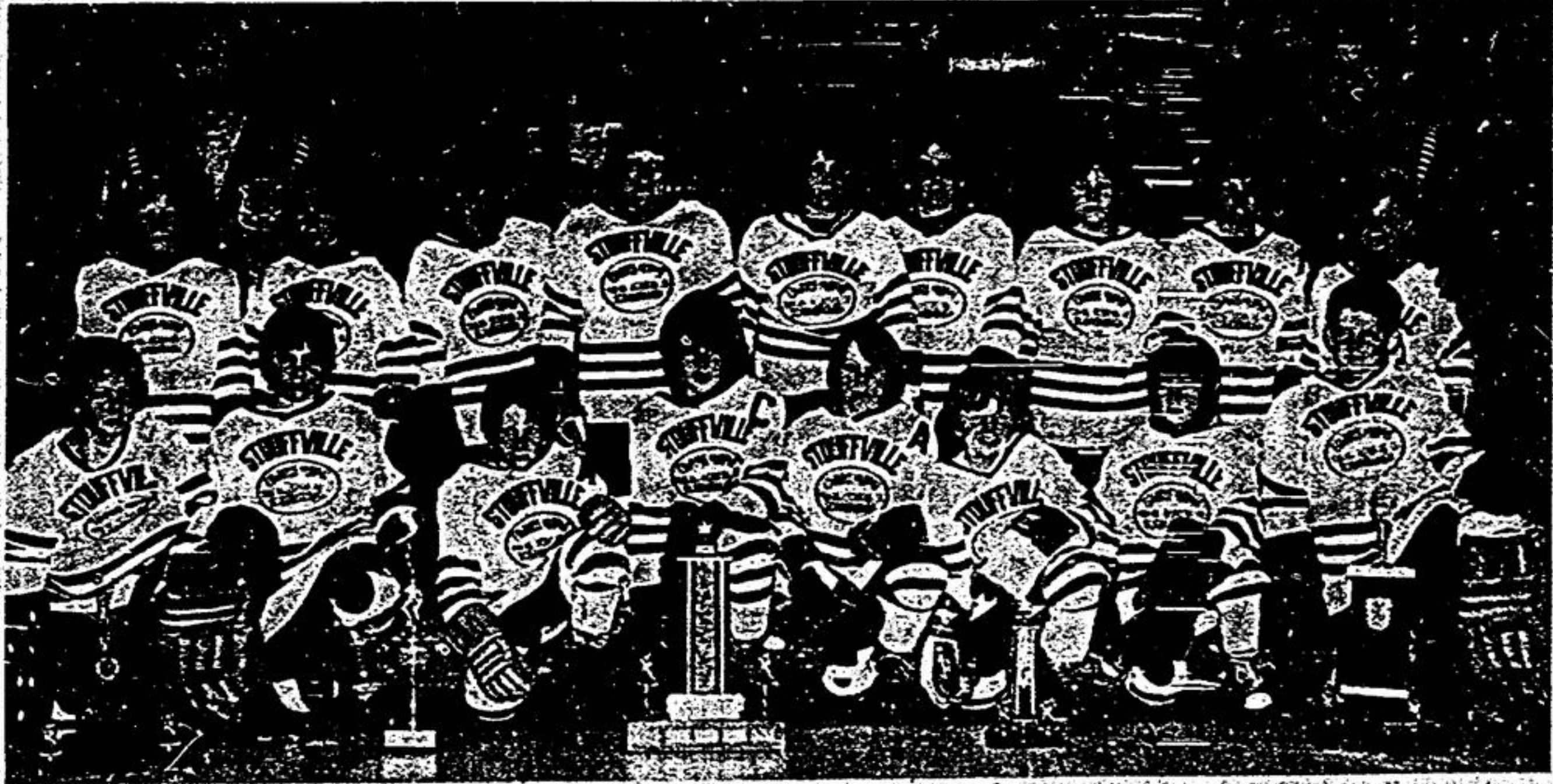


Greenwood News Nursing degree presentation important day

YORK-SIMCOE: The new C.N. Barrie to Toronto commuter is definitely "permanent". This is the claim of Sinclair Stevens, federal member, York-Simcoe. "It's not a trial run, it's the real thing," he said. The initial trip, April 1, accommodated 134 passengers from the following locations: Barrie, 35; Aurora, 29; Newmarket, 19; LeRoy, 16; and Maple, 15. Monthly rates are competitive with Go-Bus charges, says Mr. Stevens, and it is hoped the running time to Toronto can be shortened by ten or fifteen minutes. "I hope local residents will use the facility on an increasing basis," says the local M.P. "It sure beats driving."
