STOUFFVILLE — Tucked away at the rear of a private lot west of Montreal Street is a boat-building shop. Inside is a nearly-completed sailing ship, called a trimaran. Its owner and builder is Don McCurdy.

The craft, 36 feet long and 20 feet wide, has been five years in the making. It weighs about seven tons.

Construction is of fibre glass, with two masts, 40 feet high.

Initial work was done in the family basement. Later, it was moved to an enclosed shop outside. Don hopes to have it ready for its maiden voyage some time this summer.
