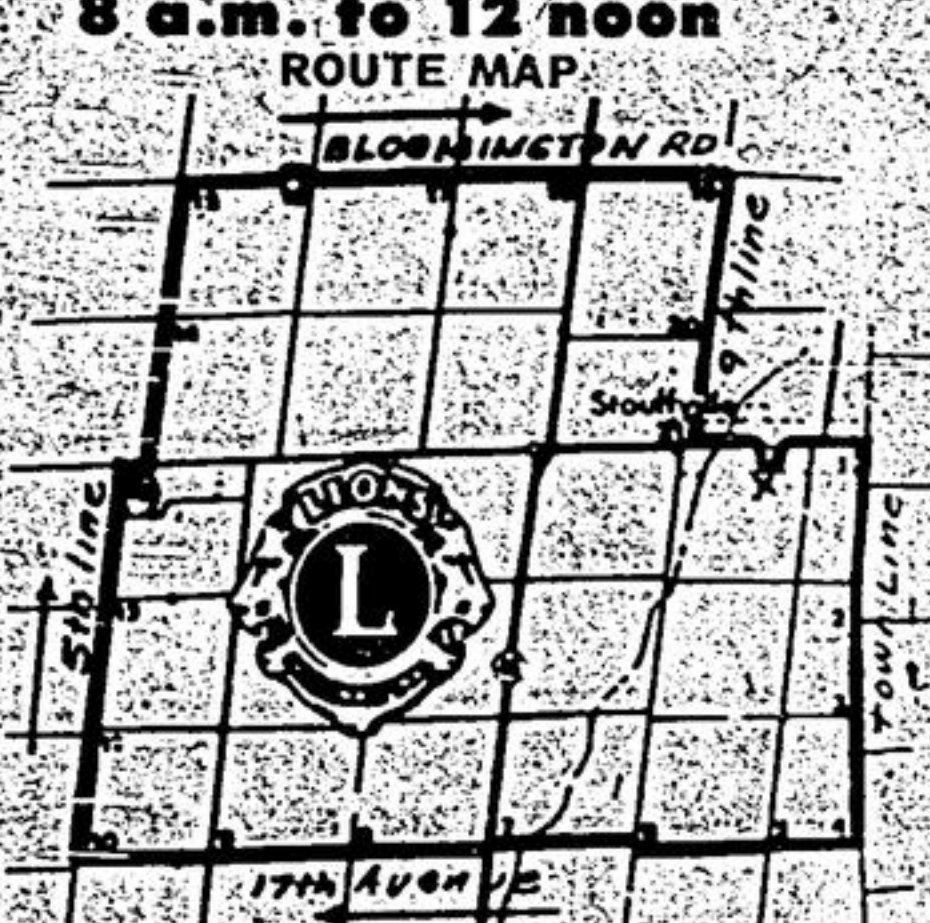

## Strike a decisive event

STOUFFVILLE For David Herbert of Hawthorne Ave., the recent teacher's strike was a "decisive" and significant event in the course of his life.

In his final year at Stouffville Dist. Secondary School, the 18-year-old Stouffville youth decided to leave school and is presently employed as a machine operator at Cable Tech plant.

The strike influenced his decision to leave school, but was not the decisive factor, "I would have made it through if I had stayed."

"I saw the strike coming, and thought it would last a week at most," he told the Tribune. "When it dragged on a month, I started to consider quitting."

"If it hadn't been for the strike, I would have stayed," the young man added. "But I can't blame the strike, my year would have been obtainable if I had gone back."

His job at Cable Tech pays \$3.50 per hour and he is on rotating shift work, which means awkward work times. But, "the job is not that demanding."

"At work, the conversation is on a low level—cars and women," David Herbert said. "It is really different than school."

He misses the "kids at school," because he got along well with people, and, "I even miss some of the teachers."

"But I miss the social part most of all," David said.

He was involved in the school band, drama club and public speaking. His plans include working as a Lifeguard at Bruce's Mill for the summer and then to attend community college to find a permanent job in the fall.
