MARKHAM — The Peach's community lost a lifelong resident, a respected neighbor and friend in the passing, May 21 of Henry Miller, conc. 7, R. R. 2, Markham. Mr. Miller died in Scarboro Centenary Hospital three days following admittance. He was 79.
Henry Miller was born on the home farm, the son of John K. and Susanna Miller. Two main phases of community life occupied his time — the church at Peach's, where he taught Sunday School and served as an elder, and Melville school, where he served as secretary and Board trustee for many years.
Surviving, besides his wife, the former Flossie MacArthur, are two sons, Murray of Guelph; Don at Markham, R. R. 2; one daughter, Jean (Mrs. J. D. Deavitt) of Highland Creek and nine grandchildren. There are two sisters, Maisie (Mrs. Harry Warriner), Markham, R. R. 2 and Marjorie (Mrs. W. J. Fraser) of Magnetawan.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS TO DESTROY WEEDS
Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land in accordance with the Weed Control Act R. S. O. 1970, C. 493, Sections 4, 14 and 20, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, are destroyed by the 15th day of June, 1974, and throughout the season, as often as it is necessary to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollens, the Municipality may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the costs against the owner and collecting in like manner as for municipal taxes.
The following is a list of noxious weeds under The Weed Control Act:
Bull Thistle, Canada Thistle, Chicory, Common Barberry, Common or European buckhorn, Dodder, Field bindweed, Goat's beard, Johnson grass, Milkweed, Nodding thistle, Poison Ivy, Ragweed, Russian Knapweed, Russian Thistle, Scotch Thistle, Sow-thistle, perennial, annual, Spurge, cypress, Spurge, leafy, Tuberosus, vetchling, Wild carrot, Wild garlic, Yellow rocket.
