TOWN OF WHITCHURCH — STOUFFVILLE NOTICE RE SWIMMING POOLS

1. that every owner of a privately owned swimming pool shall erect and maintain a fence around the swimming pool in accordance with the provisions of the By-law.
2. That plans and specifications of such fences or enclosures shall be submitted to the Building Inspector before construction commences.
3. for a penalty upon conviction for a breach of any provision of the By-law.
