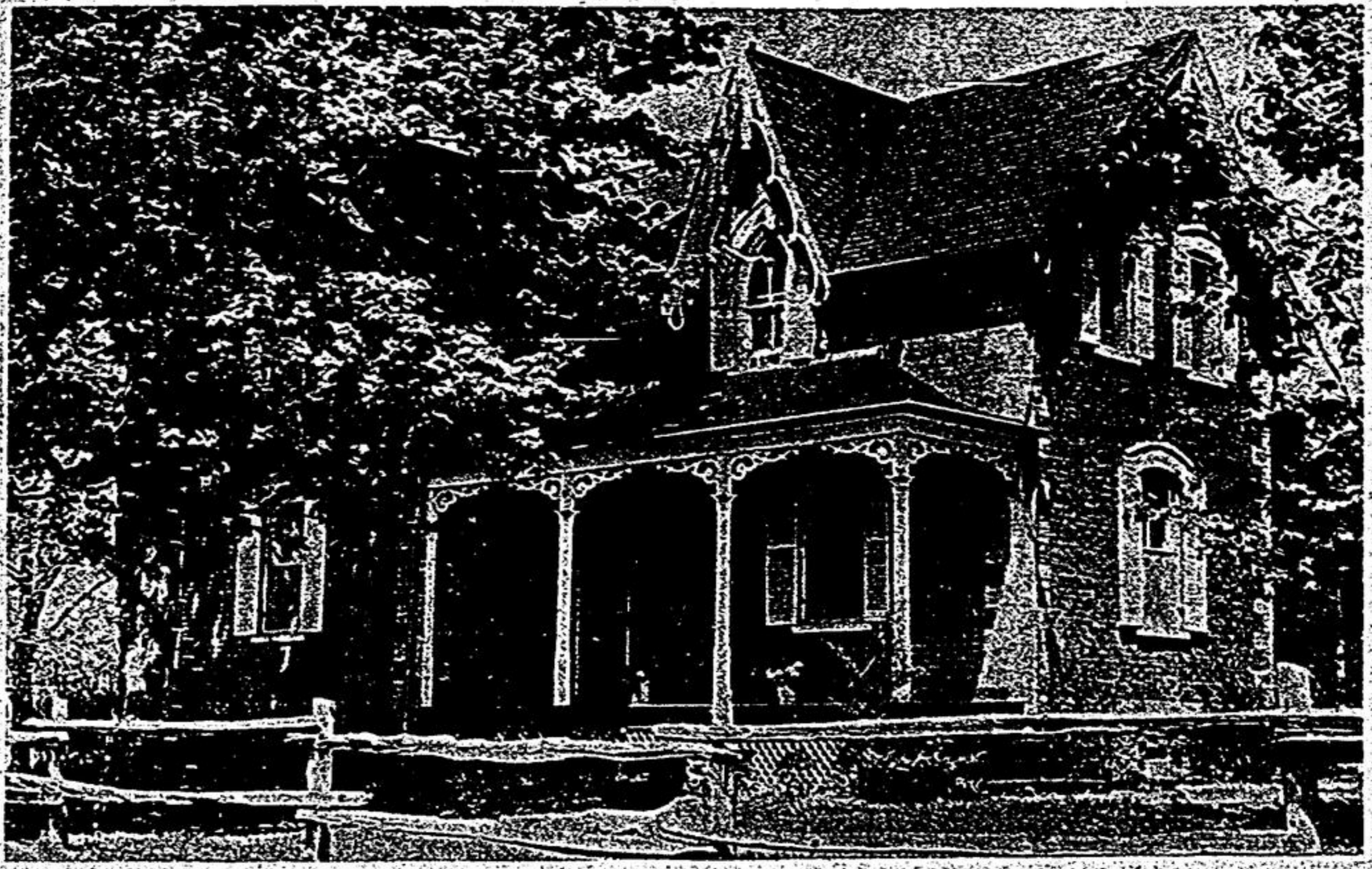
Upcoming rallies

Seven days lost

Frosty comes home

UNIONVILLE — For seven days the Houstons of R.R. 1 searched for "Frosty," their white Samoyed, a family pet for six years.

They checked with the highway department and canine control, and

advertised on a local radio station — but with no results. They talked with children in the neighborhood, but no one had seen the dog.

"As days go by I get less hopeful of getting her back," Pat Houston told The Tribune Friday. "I have a feeling someone's probably picked her up because she's such a friendly dog."

Mrs. Houston had reason to worry: Frosty had been stolen once about three years ago. But the dog was

recovered then — in the back of someone's truck. This story is another with a happy ending. The Houston's search paid off.

Some children had seen Frosty on the Buttonwood golf course, so Mrs. Houston put a notice on the bulletin board. Some golfers spotted Frosty chained up at a house behind the golf course and relayed word to the Houstons on Tuesday.

For the second time, Frosty was brought home again.
