Ten years of work but house doomed

PICKERING — The beautiful bungalow of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Smith on the Markham-Pickering Town line represents 10 years of loving work because the lot was cleared and landscaped by the owners.

It is one of the houses on the Markham and District Family Centre, Tour of Homes, June 20. It is also destined for destruction to make way for the new airport.

An impressive fireplace in the lower living room was built from rocks collected on the property, split, and set by Mr. Smith himself. A warm and pleasant atmosphere is created in the whole of the lower level, by the use of diagonally placed barn boards, cedar shingles and old beams, and all of this work was done by the owners.

A great deal of the charm of the house is in the use of color. The entrance hall with accents of a fresh spring green, leads to a living room in pale green with gold and a hint of peach.

The delicacy of these colors highlights the rich woods of a Victorian parlor table, an organ and many other beautiful antique pieces. These same colours are in a delicate chandelier fashioned from Mirano glass as a vine with bunches of grapes concealing the lights.

The second bathroom is an absolute delight, with barn board walls and exposed beams. The beams are thought to be about 160 years old. In keeping with this, the tub is of the type sitting on four clawed feet. The shelves display old medicine bottles — mainly of the miracle cure variety. There is also a tiny tiffany lamp.
