Town restricts lawn watering

STOUFFVILLE — Town residents will have their lawn watering restricted again this summer.

Council has voted to restrict watering during the months of July, August and September.

Councillor June Button opposed the by-law, "We can't be making extra work for the by-law enforcement officer if we have lots of water," she said.

"It doesn't make extra work because the residents of the village have always cooperated," rebutted, Mayor Gordon Ratcliff.

When asked if the by-law was essential, Works Superintendent Ron Gibson replied, "The water supply will be pushed to the extreme during the summer months."

Residents living west of the CNR right of way will be allowed to water between 8:30 a.m. and 8:30 p.m., Wednesday, Friday and Sunday and those on the east side will have Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday for watering days.

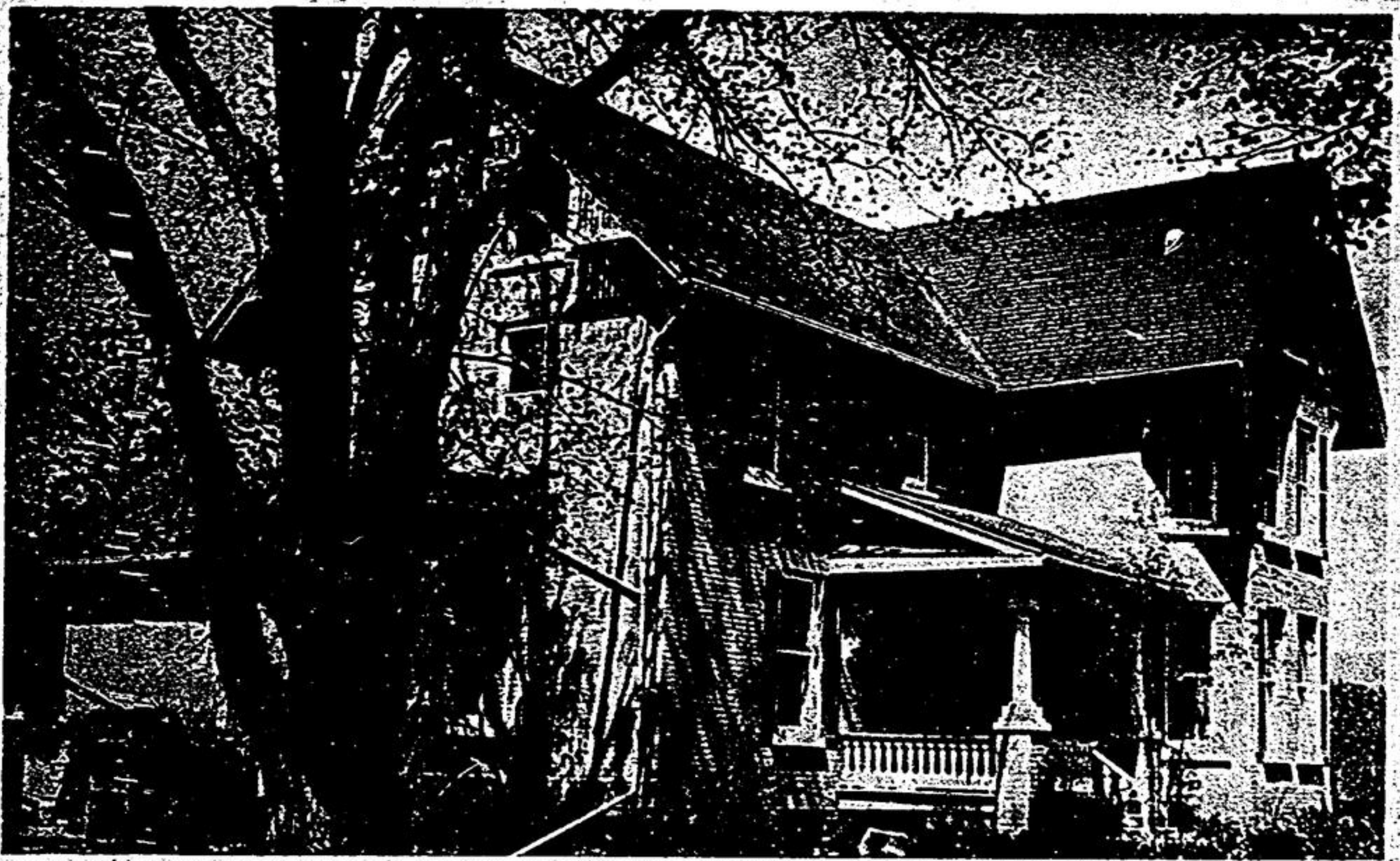
Albert Reynolds

Tour of Homes

Unspoiled by time

CLAREMONT — A step into home of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Graham at the four corners in Claremont, takes you back 80 years.

The house is one of six on the Markham and District Family Life Centre, Tour of Homes this afternoon (June 20). The charge of \$3.50 will include a map as to how to find the homes.

The Graham house has remained relatively unspoiled by the passing years.

The rooms are beautifully proportioned and provide a perfect background for the Victorian and early Canadian furnishings lovingly collected by the owners.

The living room is a charming Victorian parlor complete with ornate cornice work and a hanging light fixture

restored to the original bare pine, and the carved door frames are particularly lovely.

Throughout the house there are many other interesting antique pieces, not just displayed,

but in daily use. An exception is in the kitchen, where against a barn board wall, antique kitchen utensils, tools and even a toy scrub board and mangle are hung to be seen and admired.

In contrast, in the dining room a Quebec wardrobe made in the late 1700's sets the theme. The long dining table is known to have come from a convent and two deacons' benches serve in place of chairs.

The floors and woodwork have been

restored to the original bare pine, and the carved door frames are particularly lovely.

Throughout the house there are many other interesting antique pieces, not just displayed,

but in daily use. An exception is in the kitchen, where against a barn board wall, antique kitchen utensils, tools and even a toy scrub board and mangle are hung to be seen and admired.

Due to the excessive use of water in the Stouffville Area for the population being served, the Council has deemed it expedient to adopt the following resolution: THAT the use of a hose for the watering of lawns is prohibited for the months of July, August and September with the following exceptions:

1. That part of the former Village of Stouffville lying west of the C.N.R. right-of-way may use a hose for watering lawns between 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 p.m., Wednesday, Friday and Sunday.
2. That part of the former Village of Stouffville lying east of the C.N.R. right-of-way may use a hose for watering lawns between 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 p.m., Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Compliance with the above restrictions would be appreciated and would avoid any action being taken that would cause any inconvenience to the customer.
