"For what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"

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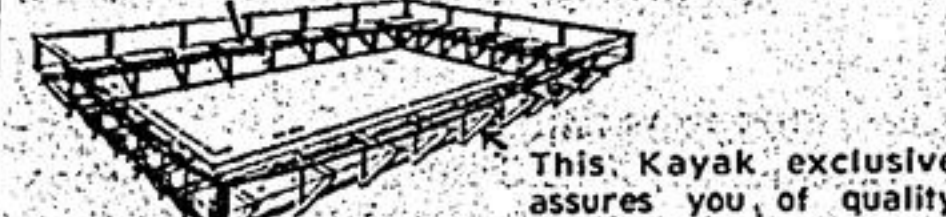


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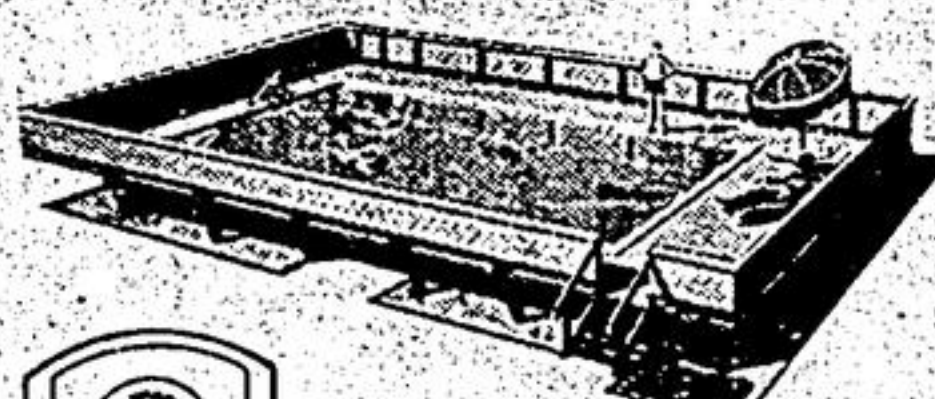
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Isabel Gregg Served 23 years

CLAREMONT - Isabel Gregg, librarian for Claremont and Green Rivers Schools, retires this month. She served as teacher and librarian for 23 years in various schools.

We asked Miss Gregg how times have changed from her first days as a teacher.

When she began teaching, "discipline wasn't a problem," she said. "The times have changed. It was unheard of to make some harsh comment about something a teacher has said."

Whereas before children simply obeyed unquestioningly, she added, now good rapport between teacher and students is needed to keep discipline. She emphasized that wasn't necessarily all for the bad.

Miss Gregg began teaching in a one-room school at Glasgow with 41 students from grades 1 to 8. Under that system, she said, "there was a much closer relationship between the community and the teacher than there is today."

She moved out of teaching for a number of years to work in the Bureau of Statistics in Ottawa. For two years during World War II, she worked as a wireless operator and "listened for may days, and what have you."

Then, she went back

into teaching at Brougham and Brock Rd. Schools. When Brock Rd. school was closed, she took on her position of the past two years as librarian at both Claremont and Green River Public Schools.

By teaching at Claremont, Miss Gregg returned to her alma mater. She and her sister Jean had attended there together, and now both women are retiring from the teaching profession. Jean Gregg has taught 37 years, the last 29 at King George Public School, Borough of York.

The Gregg sisters had planned to spend their retirement in a home they designed themselves, which was built six years ago. But the home will come under the bulldozers in the proposed airport now. Isabel Gregg has been living in the home and she and her sister had been looking forward to "sitting back and enjoying it." Around the home there is land which Miss Gregg plans to garden while she can still live there.

As a retired person, Miss Gregg hopes to do "all the things I've been putting off until I have time," such as sewing, travelling, visiting, and finishing furniture. Another thing she needs to do, however, is to find another home - and she is finding that rather difficult in the current market, she said.



Ontario believes that residents 65 or over, the blind and the disabled should have an income of at least \$2600 a year.

In July, Ontario will introduce a Special Benefits program. It will place extra funds on top of federal Guaranteed Income Supplements - enough to guarantee the elderly who are qualified residents of Ontario an income of \$2600 a year. Blind and disabled people who qualify for Family Benefits will also be entitled to these special benefits.

Beginning September 1, approved drugs prescribed by a doctor or dentist will be available, free of charge, to those qualifying for the special benefits outlined above, Family Benefits or the federal Guaranteed Income Supplement. Drug cards will be mailed automatically. You don't have to apply for them.

Who will receive these special benefits?

If you are 65 or over (with an annual income of less than \$2600)... and you now receive both Old Age Security and the Guaranteed Income Supplement... you will receive your benefits cheque each month, automatically. You do not have to apply for it.

If you are 65 or over (with an annual income of less than \$2600)... and you do not receive any federal income supplement... please give us a call. Our telephone number is shown below.

If you are blind or disabled... and you now receive assistance under Ontario's Family Benefit Program... you will receive your benefits cheque each month, automatically. You do not have to apply for it.

If you are blind or disabled... and you do not receive Provincial assistance... please give us a call. Our telephone number is shown below.
