A public meeting will be held by the Planning Board of the Town of Whitechurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to discuss the following proposed Official Plan amendment whereby it is the intent of Council to:

Consider proposed amendment No. 54 to the Official Plan of the Township of Markham, now in the Whitechurch-Stouffville planning area, which changes the land use designation from "Rural" to "Community Commercial" on lands described as part of lot 32, concession 8, former Township of Markham. The subject site is located on the east side of Highway No. 48 south of Ringwood. A business known as Stouffville Trailer Ltd. is being conducted on the site.

You are invited to attend the meeting and to state your support or objection to the proposed amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting. The amending document may be examined at the Clerk's Office, Municipal Building, during regular business hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
