Mayor Gordon Ratcliff

Town's apparent reversal was not a reversal at all

STOUFFVILLE— An apparent reversal by Whitchurch-Stouffville Council was not a reversal at all, Mayor Gordon Ratcliff said in his weekly press conference.

He was referring to a Planning Board decision last week to allow a 50-acre industrial subdivision in the Ballantrae area. The 145-acre parcel is owned by Schickedanz Developments.

The mayor said council "de-designated" the part of the 145 that was not to be developed for industrial. It is located on the northeast corner of Highway 48 and Aurora Road.

The developer, according to the mayor, wants remaining lands in holding residential and holding industrial designations. The designation puts the area outside the 50 acres approved in agricultural zone.

Is the kind of proposal made by a developer for cluster development and large areas of park land the kind of thing the council would encourage?

"We should certainly investigate it fully," the mayor said. "The land there would certainly lend itself to it."

The mayor said that the problem might come over who would administer the lands left for open green space and whether they would be public parkland or not.

"Personally, I would like to see regional planners give their opinion," Mayor Ratcliff said. "It's something we haven't seen before."

How will new noise contours for the Pickering Airport, recently released by the government, affect the area?

The mayor explained that persistent complaining by the town, prodded the Ministry of Transport into issuing the new contours.

"It is pleasing to see a drawback in the noise contours," he said.

The percentage of frozen land in Whitchurch-Stouffville is relatively small, he added. Those under the minister's freeze order cannot build, although the
