Ministry has spanned the continent

LEMONVILLE — The Lemonville Church was packed to capacity to honor the Rev. Roy Inglis on June 30, 50 years to the day from his ordination in Eaton, Saskatchewan.
 Since then the ministry of "LA-LI-WI-YO-STA", as his Oneida Indian friends call him, has spanned the continent. The title, meaning "He makes peace," is the tribute of Indians he worked with in London, Ontario.
 The latest ministry of Mr. Inglis has been as a part-time charge with Pine Orchard Union Church. From 1963-68 he became well-known and respected throughout the area from his work at the Ballantrae - Lemonville charge.
 At the reception in honor of Mr. Inglis, he was surrounded by friends from both his recent and more distant past. They came from across Canada and from as far away as California.
 The ministry of Mr. Inglis began after graduating from Pine Hill University, Nova Scotia in 1924. Three years later, he married Edith Kennedy while in Eaton.
 He remembers well those days and tells how he would ski for 17 miles on a Sunday to preach. Present at the reception on Sunday were a couple from Eaton whom he had married 47 years ago.
 From 1924-45 Mr. Inglis served as a chaplain in the Navy. During that time, his wife Edith died. In 1945 he answered a call to Ajax Interdenomination Church, where he met and married Henrietta Kerr. Then, in 1946, he and his wife began nine years of service in the Indian community at Morley, Alberta. Assisted by his wife, Mr. Inglis became principal of the Brandon Indian Residential School where he was preacher, teacher, father and friend to 182 students.
 Later, Mr. Inglis worked with the Oneida Indians as part of the Carodoc Indian Mission. He recalls with amusement how very poorly he performed the Indian dances at the ceremonies; but the Indians forgave his clumsiness. Some Oneida Indians honored Mr. Inglis at the reception by singing for him in English and in Oneida.
 When asked what he enjoyed the most in his ministry, he said, "meeting people." Would he change anything? "I would like to change myself, to begin with," he replied. "There should be more caring for others instead of making more of the dollar."
 His comment on today's morals is that they are "no worse or no better than other generations. People still have temptations and will fall by the way; but by the grace of God they will come back."
 Last year the area shared with Mr. Inglis the loss of his wife Henrietta. Despite that, he continues to give of his time, making weekly visits to patients at Brandon and St. John's hospitals.
