

# After escape series of thefts

**STOUFFVILLE** — One 14-year old boy is back in Bowmanville Training School and a Stouffville youth is in custody, following a series of thefts last week.

The chain of events started July 10 when the lad escaped from the Training School and was alleged to have stolen a 1974 model car from Cowan Buick Ltd.

Early the next morning gas, oil, a radio and binoculars disappeared from

Harrison's Gravel Pit in Goodwood. The police were notified and two youths were arrested at Musselman's Lake, July 11.

Along with car theft and the gravel pit thefts the boys are charged in four Richmond Hill incidents which involved theft of two cars. Other thefts credited to the youths include two tape decks from cars.

Three charges were laid against the one lad and five against the Stouffville youth.

## Travels to Ottawa, Quebec

**STOUFFVILLE** — It's not every day that you have an expense-paid trip to Ottawa and Quebec — along with 18 other members of your age group.

But that's what happened to Danny Glenn, 15, of Mill St. recently. Danny traveled with a group of other high school students from the York region as a participant in the "Young Voyageur Program."

"I thought it was really nice. You learned a lot, especially in Ottawa," Danny said about the trip. Danny will enter grade 10 next fall at Stouffville District Secondary School.

The program is jointly sponsored by the provincial and federal governments. According to a promotional pamphlet, "the Young Voyageurs discover for themselves the variety and beauty of Canada and form new friendships that may enrich their whole lives."

In the case of Danny, the program appears to have succeeded. He was a stranger to his 18 fellow-travelers when he began the trip on July 9, but "we all became good friends before we left," he said.

A favorite part of the trip for Danny was a visit to the Thailand embassy in Ottawa, where they viewed a film on Thailand and talked to the ambassador. In Ottawa,

the group also toured Parliament, the Supreme Court, Carleton University, the National Art Centre, and the Nation Gallery.

They stayed in a 16-floor university residence in Ottawa, along with other Young Voyageurs from all over Canada.

On July 11 the group toured Upper Canada Village, which Danny said is "like Black Creek pioneer village, except bigger."

The students had a unique experience on their visit to Montmagny, Quebec. There, they

stayed in the homes of French-speaking residents. Danny said that he communicated with his hosts by speaking a little bit of French and a little bit of English.

After almost a week
