Public meeting to discuss new property law

TORONTO — The Honourable Robert Welch, Q.C., will be hosting a public meeting to discuss the recommendations of the report of the Ontario Law Reform Commission on family property law Wednesday, Aug. 28, 1974 at 8 p.m. at the St. Lawrence Centre, Toronto.

Similar meetings, which have been well attended, were held earlier in the summer in various centres of the Province, including St. Catharines, Hamilton, Windsor, London, Thunder Bay and Sault Ste. Marie.

"When I tabled the family property law report in the Legislature in March of this year," Mr. Welch said, "I emphasized the desire of the Government to encourage as much public consideration of these fundamental issues as possible. During the normal course of family life, the ownership of property does not loom large as a day to day consideration. However, at some time during their lives, aspects of these issues will be important to many individuals and the recent decision of the Supreme Court of Canada in the Murdock case has served to focus considerable public attention in this area of the law."

Police seek picture takers

STOUFFVILLE — Police are seeking two men involved in a transaction that left a Stouffville housewife with three small photographs, after she paid \$42.75 for three large ones.

Doris Ferguson of Winlane Dr. was approached at her home concerning some pictures, that would be taken of her son. The man said he was a representative of Elite Portraits of Maple.

The photographer took some pictures of the boy, then returned a week later with three small color prints. Mrs. Ferguson paid \$42.75 with the promise of three larger photos in three weeks. That was June 29.

By last week the pictures had not arrived and Mrs. Ferguson called York Regional Police. They are seeking two men — one is 6'4" tall, weighs 200 lbs. and is about 40 years old with grey hair; the other is 5'6" and 140 lbs., also 40 years old but with black hair.

Conservation authorities' history in new book

TORONTO — Ontario's system of conservation authorities is world renowned, and professionals from many countries come here to study it. The first director of the Conservation Branch, Ontario Department of Planning and Development, was Dr. Arthur H. Richardson, and he has written a history of the conservation movement up to 1970 in a 140-page hard cover book just published by the University of Toronto Press.

Dr. Richardson was at the centre of the development of conservation in Ontario from 1944 to 1961 — a period when conservation embraced recreation, historical preservation, and youth work, as well as such concerns as flood control, reforestation, soil protection and wild-life management.

A.S.L. Barnes, who worked with Dr. Richardson and succeeded him as director of the renamed Conservation Authorities Branch, has supplemented Dr. Richardson's account with material concerning the period from 1961 to 1971.

The book contains photographs and map illustrations of the province plus a foreword by C. G. Caswell, chairman of the Ontario Conservation Authorities.
